Time may be surrendered by deferring (1) one minute to another speaker, not to exceed a total of (8) eight minutes. The speaker wishing to defer time must be present when the item is heard. In order to be recognized and present an item, each speaker must complete and submit to the Recording Secretary a Request to Speak form prior to the beginning of the item being announced by the Chair (forms are available at the entrance to the meeting room). Speakers are taken in the order slips are submitted.

**Items in Consent Calendar Section A** have already been considered by the Commission at a previous meeting where the public was invited to comment, after which a decision was made. These items are not subject to public discussion at this meeting because the vote taken at the previous meeting was final. Resolutions concerning decisions made at previous meetings are for the purpose of memorializing the decision to assure the accuracy of the findings, the prior vote, and any conditions imposed.



CALL TO ORDER

Chair Saul called the meeting to order at 5:01 p.m.

ROLL CALL

The following persons were recorded in attendance by the Recording Secretary:

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Guy Blake led the Pledge of Allegiance.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

MOTION Commissioner Matlow moved and Commissioner Randall seconded a motion to approve the agenda. The motion carried 4-0, Vice Chair Frost absent.

REPORT ON POSTING OF AGENDA

Recording Secretary Linden reported that the agenda for the meeting was properly posted on July 28, 2016.

ITEM 1.A. PUBLIC COMMENTS

None.

ITEM 1.B. COMMISSIONER COMMENTS

Commissioner Matlow suggested Birdview Avenue be made a one-way street, with a lane for emergency vehicles, from the beach to upper Birdview to reduce summer traffic and speeding. She stated it had been previously discussed and dismissed, but Councilmember House brought up the same suggestion at a recent City Council meeting.

She discussed issues related to the Point Dume Traffic Management Plan. She stated widening roads and removing encroachments enhances public safety by reducing traffic, crime, trash, and damage to natural habitat in the headlands. She requested the safety component of widening streets and the addition of parking be added to a future agenda.

Recording Secretary Linden stated the Point Dume issues were being addressed by the City Council and would be added to a Commission agenda only if the Council made that assignment. Chair Saul suggested Commissioner Matlow discuss her concerns with her appointing councilmember.

Commissioner Randall asked why there are no flashing lights on Civic Center Way indicating that it is a school zone. Public Works Director Brager stated staff could look into it. He stated warrants may be required. Commissioner Randall discussed the traffic backup from a recent accident at Temescal. She expressed frustration with inadequate traffic management. Public Works Director Brager suggested she bring up the issue at next week's PCH Task Force meeting. Commissioner Randall requested an update on the La Costa crosswalk project. Public Works Superintendent Aladjajian stated Caltrans sent an engineering team to the location to develop ideas and design exceptions that might move the project forward.

Commissioner May discussed Graeme Clifford's suggestions to adjust signal sequencing at Topanga Canyon to reduce backup on PCH. He discussed sign repairs, brush clearance, enhancing medians on PCH and congestion at Nobu. He discussed Caltrans' efforts to increase visibility at El Matador Beach. He suggested additional signage to increase pedestrian safety. He stated new signs were needed near Surfrider Beach to increase citation enforceability. He thanked the City Manager for getting Los Angeles County Beaches and Harbors to increase the number of personnel collecting parking fees at the Zuma parking lot that reduced traffic backups. He commended the Volunteers on Patrol (VOP).

Chair Saul reported he met with City Manager Feldman regarding how the Commission's meetings should be conducted. He stated she advised him that the City was buying signs that will be installed in tow-away zones by Caltrans. In response to Chair Saul, Public Works Superintendent Aladjajian stated the City is working with Caltrans to finalize the design of the signs, which he expects will arrive in 2 to 3 weeks. Chair Saul stated he discussed homeless issues with the pastor of Malibu Methodist Church and Sheriff's Deputy Treinen at the request of Burt Ross. He stated Mr. Ross advised him that his group is working with an agency to place homeless individuals in homes. He expressed gratitude for the work of the VOPs.

Commissioner Randall asked if any of the City's six digital speed signs had been removed. Public Works Superintendent Aladjajian reported that one on PCH north of Heathercliff was removed after it was damaged in a traffic accident.

ITEM 4        NEW BUSINESS

A.        Update on Projects Affecting Traffic on Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) and City Streets

Recommended Action: 1) Receive and file status updates on projects affecting traffic on PCH and City streets, including: a) Point Dume Speed Advisory Signs; b) Engineering and Traffic Survey; c) Valet Attendant Safety Requirements; d) California Incline Bridge Replacement Project; and e) Caltrans maintenance work; and 2) Provide questions to be asked during the City's biweekly conference call with Caltrans staff.

Chair Saul asked if the penalties for violating the valet ordinance had been established. Public Works Superintendent Aladjajian stated the fines were included in the Municipal Code.

Commissioner May discussed the deterioration of PCH and questioned why surface improvement had not been done in more than three or four years. Public Works Director Brager discussed the City's road maintenance program. Commissioner May requested staff ask Caltrans if slurry work or grinding and overlay on PCH in Malibu, including bike lanes and shoulders, was scheduled.

Commissioner Matlow thanked the City for the speed reductions in the Engineering and Traffic Survey. Public Works Director Brager confirmed that all roads in Point Dume, except Dume Drive, now had 25 miles per hour speed limits.

Commissioner Matlow suggested a joint meeting be scheduled with the Public Works Commission.

In response to Chair Saul, Public Works Director Brager stated staff could provide an update on work recommended in the PCH Safety Study on an upcoming agenda.

Commissioner May commended City Manager Feldman for increased communication with Caltrans. He discussed increased fire prevention efforts in Topanga Canyon.

Commissioner Matlow suggested installing signs indicating Speed Limits Strictly Enforced. Public Works Director Brager stated he would see if that signage was recommended in the PCH Safety Study.

Commissioner Randall requested Caltrans be asked to repair the lip on the land side of PCH between Moonshadows and Las Flores Canyon Road. She stated she would provide Public Works staff with address information for the worst areas.

B. Public Safety Agency Activity

Recommended Action: Discuss recent Public Safety Agency activities and receive and file monthly activity reports from the County of Los Angeles Sheriff's Department, Fire Department and Lifeguard Division.

In response to Chair Saul, Mark Russo, VOP, stated VOPs spent approximately 25 percent of their time near El Matador Beach. He explained one car usually laps around Paradise Cove, Point Dume and Zuma Beach, while another is usually in the Surfrider Beach area. He stated VOPs also provide assistance to the Beach Team. He discussed signage needed from the entrance to El Matador to the first residence nearby. He stated a decoy car placed at El Matador had no impact. He stated pedestrians crossing PCH or walking along the right side of the highway were given verbal warnings. In response to Commissioner May, Mr. Russo stated increased signage would not hurt but would probably not change the situation.

CONSENSUS

By consensus, the Commission requested the City Manager ask Caltrans about the feasibility of installing pedestrian signage near El Matador, similar to signage near border cities.

Guy Blake, VOP, stated the only solution to the problems at El Matador was to reduce the speed limit.

Commissioner May asked if the State had liability or responsibility to provide traffic management due to heavy, unsafe traffic creating a public nuisance.

In response to Commissioner Randall, Mr. Russo explained how websites and phone apps that provide information about beaches and hiking trails resulted in the number of visitors to Malibu increasing dramatically over the past few years. He suggested signs warning pedestrians and motorists to watch for each other would be helpful.

#### CONSENSUS

By consensus, the Commission requested that updates on the La Costa Crosswalk, ingress and egress to the Trancas shopping center, and implementation of PCH Safety Study recommendations be added to upcoming agendas.



Subject: Emergency Preparedness Program Quarterly Report

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**RECOMMENDED ACTION:** Receive and file update on the City's Emergency Preparedness Program activities for the period of June through August 2016.

**DISCUSSION:** The following details activities related to the City's Emergency Preparedness program for June through August 2016:

## Training Classes:

- A series of CERT classes was conducted in June and July. Sixteen people participated, including a coordinator from the Los Angeles City CERT program who attended the final drill and wrote a very complimentary article in their monthly newsletter about our program.
- Regular CPR and first aid classes were held for staff and members of the public.
- Training was provided to staff for dealing with traumatic bleeding wounds to be better prepared for the threat of an active shooter scenario. Trauma kits, including tourniquets and high efficiency bandages, have been distributed to all departments.
- Staff attended a training on the County's planned response to an Anthrax release incident, hosted by Los Angeles County Department of Public Health.
- Staff attended a training on Community Mass Care, hosted by the Ventura County Department of Public Health and the Governor's Office of Emergency Services (OES).

- The Malibu CERT team practiced their first aid and medical responder skills with a functional drill held in the field at Point Dume Marine Science Elementary School.
- An emergency operations orientation for new full-time staff members has been developed and implemented. This half-hour briefing provides new staff members with a basic overview of their role within the City during a disaster, plus guidance for how to remain safe or evacuate during an emergency.

#### Outreach

- An article has been published in PC Magazine highlighting the City of Malibu's preparedness for emergencies. The ESC was interviewed, as was the President of the Malibu Chamber of Commerce, who stressed the City's partnership with Malibu's business community to better share information and resources during a disaster. PC Magazine has a readership of 10 million.
- The Malibu CERT team staffed an information booth at the Malibu Arts Festival. Emergency preparedness information was distributed and questions were answered about out training programs.
- Emergency preparedness information was provided to Malibu High School for distribution to parents at the "Get Your Stuff" event prior to the new school year.

#### Meetings

- Meetings include Operational Area-B, the County Supervisor's Fire Safe Alliance, Southern California Edison and a responder agency debrief of the Calabasas "Old Fire" incident.

Subject: Update on Caltrans Maintenance Projects Recommended in the Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) Safety Study

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**RECOMMENDED ACTION:** Receive and file status update of the Caltrans Maintenance Projects recommended in the PCH Safety Study.

**DISCUSSION:** In 2012, the City, in collaboration with the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG), commissioned a study to analyze and identify potential safety improvements along the PCH corridor within the Malibu city limits. The study was completed in June 2015 and included a list of recommended maintenance projects to be performed by Caltrans. Attached is the original PCH Safety Study Maintenance Project list and the current status of those maintenance projects.


The Maintenance Project list contains 20 projects and, to date, Caltrans reports it has completed a total of 12 of those projects, or 65% of the project list.

Subject: Update on Projects Affecting Traffic on Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) and City Streets

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**RECOMMENDED ACTION:** 1) Receive and file status updates on projects affecting traffic on PCH and City streets, including: a) Point Dume Speed Advisory Signs; b) Engineering and Traffic Survey; c) Valet Attendant Safety Requirements; d) California Incline Bridge Replacement Project; e) Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) Parking Master Plan; and f) Caltrans maintenance work; and 2) Provide questions to be asked during the City's biweekly conference call with Caltrans staff.

**DISCUSSION:** Below are the latest updates on the status of projects in and around Malibu that affect traffic and public safety on PCH and City streets:

- a) Point Dume Speed Advisory Signs – This project proposes to install six speed advisory signs, with four in the Point Dume neighborhood and two on Busch Drive. The contractor has ordered the signs, which are scheduled to be installed in September.
- b) Engineering and Traffic Survey – Staff has completed the Council-directed action to lower the speed limits from 30 miles per hour (mph) to 25 mph on the following six City street segments:
  - Big Rock Drive between Cool Oak Way and PCH
  - Busch Drive between Merritt Drive and PCH
  - Carbon Canyon Road between Carbon Mesa Road and PCH
  - Cliffside Drive between Birdview Avenue and Fernhill Drive

- Wildlife Road between Zumirez Drive and the end of the road
  - Bluewater Road between Birdview Avenue and Dume Drive
- c) Valet Attendant Safety Requirements – On July 11, 2016, at the recommendation of the Public Safety Commission, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 407 (Attachment 1), adding Malibu Municipal Code Chapter 9.38 requiring valets to wear high visibility safety apparel when providing valet services in the public right-of-way. The ordinance applies to all valet services anywhere in the City, at restaurants, as well as private events. The City has requested the Volunteers on Patrol (VOP) team conduct outreach to local valet services and restaurants by distributing copies of the ordinance and flyer (Attachment 2). The VOPs will be prepared to answer any questions the valet operators or attendants may have regarding the new requirements and will encourage attendants to wear the high-visibility safety apparel at all times. The City is also mailing information to valet services and restaurants directly and promoting it on social media and on the City’s Code Enforcement webpage. The Planning Department will include ordinance requirements as conditions of approval for permits where valet parking will be used, including conditional use permits, temporary use permits and special event permits. The ordinance went into effect on August 11, 2016.
- d) California Incline Bridge Replacement Project Reopens (City of Santa Monica) – The City of Santa Monica will re-open the California Incline, the main connector road between PCH and Ocean Avenue, on Thursday, September 1, at 5:00 PM, following a 17-month project to construct a new bridge that will include a wider sidewalk and bicycle lanes. Pedestrians and cyclists can try out the new California Incline on September 1, between 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM, before it opens for vehicle traffic at 5:00 PM.
- e) Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) Parking Study – The PCH Parking Study is a City and Caltrans grant-funded project that is managed by the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG). In general, the Study will examine the 21-mile corridor of PCH in Malibu, analyze the existing shoulder, and develop recommendations to improve safety and mobility throughout the region. The project was launched in the fall of 2015 and is expected to be completed in spring 2017. The traffic engineering firm, Stantec Engineering, was selected as the consultant hired to perform the study. The major phases of the project include:
- Collecting existing parking signage and markings to create a database of existing street conditions
  - Examination of safety mobility and parking standards
  - Examining the available areas along the highway with the goal of maximizing the number of parking spaces for residents and visitors while making it safer to park and exit vehicles
  - Develop recommendations to improve shoulder conditions and promote safety and mobility

At this time, the consultant is wrapping up the existing conditions phase and is working on the safety mobility and parking standards task. The City will host a public meeting to discuss the study and possible recommendations in the coming months.

- f) Caltrans Maintenance Work (PCH within Malibu) – According to Caltrans, highway maintenance crews performed shoulder and median brush clearance, and trash removal.

The Commission may provide staff with a list of questions to be asked during the City's biweekly conference call with Caltrans. Responses to those questions will be reported back to the Commission at its next Regular meeting.

ORDINANCE NO. 407

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MALIBU ADDING CHAPTER 9.38 TO TITLE 9 (PUBLIC PEACE AND SAFETY) OF THE MALIBU MUNICIPAL CODE REQUIRING VALET PARKING ATTENDANTS TO WEAR HIGH-VISIBILITY SAFETY APPAREL WHILE PROVIDING VALET SERVICES IN ANY PUBLIC RIGHTS-OF-WAY WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS; AND AMENDING SECTION 1.10.040 OF CHAPTER 1.10 (ADMINISTRATIVE CITATIONS AND PENALTIES) OF TITLE 1 (GENERAL PROVISIONS) OF THE MALIBU MUNICIPAL CODE TO REFLECT THAT VIOLATIONS OF CHAPTER 9.38 SHALL BE SUBJECT TO THE CITY'S ADMINISTRATIVE PENALTY PROVISIONS

The City Council of the City of Malibu does hereby ordain as follows:

SECTION 1.

Chapter 9.38 is hereby added to of Title 9 (Public Peace and Welfare) of the Malibu Municipal Code to read as follows:

**Chapter 9.38**

**VALET ATTENDANT SAFETY REQUIREMENTS**

- 9.38.010**      **Definitions.**
- 9.38.020**      **High-visibility safety apparel required.**
- 9.38.030**      **Penalties.**

**9.38.010**      **Definitions.**

For purposes of this chapter, the following terms have the following meaning:

A.      "High-Visibility Safety Apparel" means any vest, shirt, or jacket which meets the following conditions: the outer material color shall be fluorescent orange-red, fluorescent yellow-green or a combination of the two as defined by the American National Standards Institute/International Equipment Safety Association for class 2 or 3 risk exposure; the retroreflective material shall be orange, yellow, white, silver, yellow-green, or a fluorescent version of these colors; and the apparel shall be designed to clearly identify the wearer as a person.

B.      "Person" means any natural person, firm, partnership, association, corporation or other entity.

C.      "Public Right-of-way" means any area within the City of Malibu designated for public use as a public street, pedestrian way or other thoroughfare, including but not limited to publicly maintained sidewalks, highways, roadways, avenues, lanes, or alleys.

D. “Retroreflective” means a vest, shirt, or jacket that is capable of clearly retro-reflecting light, under normal atmospheric conditions, from a minimum distance of 1,000 feet when illuminated by the head lights of standard automobiles.

E. “Valet Parking” means the receiving, taking possession of, driving, moving, parking or storing any vehicle that is left in one location to be driven to another location for parking, whether or not a charge is imposed for the valet parking service.

F. “Valet Parking Attendant” means any employee or agent of a Valet Parking Operator, or any employee or agent of a business providing Valet Parking to its customers, who receives, takes possession of or moves any vehicle, or who handles the keys to any vehicle left with the attendant for Valet Parking.

G. “Valet Parking Operator” means any person engaged in the business of Valet Parking, including any person contracting with a Valet Parking Operator to provide Valet Parking, or any person engaged in providing Valet Parking services to the public.

**9.38.020 High-Visibility Safety Apparel required.**

A. No Valet Parking Operator shall employ, direct or otherwise permit, a Valet Parking Attendant to park or retrieve any vehicle on, along, or across any Public Right-of-way, unless that Valet Parking Attendant is wearing High-Visibility Safety Apparel as specified in this chapter.

B. Valet Parking Attendants shall wear High-Visibility Safety Apparel at all times while Valet Parking on any Public Right-of-way, including while walking on, along or across any Public Right-of-way.

**9.38.030 Penalties.**

A. The City has determined that this chapter is necessary to protect health, life, and property of the City and its inhabitants.

B. Any violation of the provisions of this chapter by any person shall be subject to the administrative penalty provisions of Title 1 chapter 1.10 of this Code.

C. This chapter authorizes any deputy sheriff, or city employee or agent of the city designated by the director of any city department, to administer, implement, and enforce the provisions of this chapter.

SECTION 2. Subsection A of Section 1.10.040 of Chapter 1.10 (Administrative Citations and Penalties) of Title 1 (General Provisions) of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:


**1.10.040 Code violations subject to administrative penalty procedures.**

A. In addition to any criminal, civil or other legal remedy established by this code or other law that may be pursued to address violations of the municipal code, the violations described in the municipal code titles, chapters and sections listed below are subject to the administrative penalty procedures and other provisions of this chapter:



15. Chapter 15.16: Mechanical Code Adopted;
16. Title 17: Zoning.

SECTION 3. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this ordinance and enter it into the book of original ordinances.

**SCHOOL ISSUES**

There were no school issues this month.

**INTERVENTIONS**

No interventions were held this month.

**COMMUNITY / CRIMINAL ISSUES**

1. We conducted a monthly parental resource class at Lost Hills Sheriff's Station. This program was developed by our unit and is designed to educate parents about: 1) The current trends in juvenile behavior and delinquency, 2) Alcohol/narcotic awareness and recognition, 3) School policy and campus issues, 4) Gang awareness and negative peer relations, 5) Parental rights and responsibilities and, 6) Parental responses to incorrigible and/or delinquent behavior. We also address the specific concerns relating to the minor's behavior. We educate the minor and their parents of possible criminal behavior and the legal consequences. We offer suggestions and make recommendations to improve the minor's quality of life.
2. We spoke with numerous citizens and parents who called to question various juvenile concerns and issues in the community. We also provide the parents with various juvenile resource programs within our community.
3. We met with the Sylmar Juvenile Court District Attorney regarding the investigation and filing of criminal charges against juvenile offenders.
4. We met with Captain Pat Davoren throughout the month in order to keep him up to date regarding our units investigations and current juvenile issues within our city.
5. We entered juveniles into the Juvenile Automated Index system for various violations.
6. We made court appearances to testify as witnesses on the part of the People of the State of California and attended court proceedings in cases generated from the City of Malibu. We also investigated, prepared, and filed cases with the District Attorney's office. We additionally assisted other investigators in the preparation of cases for court.
7. We met with station narcotic detectives on a regular basis to exchange information regarding juvenile and drug related issues. We have worked with the narcotic detectives on several narcotic cases directly and indirectly involving juveniles.

8. We handled the processing and follow-up of various juvenile referrals brought to the attention of this unit (i.e., Juvenile Information Forms, Field Interview Cards, Juvenile Automated Index, and citations for various juvenile contacts with uniform personnel).
9. We conducted our normal checks of juvenile problem areas in the city during weekend evenings and responded to juvenile related calls for service.
10. The Juvenile Intervention Team assisted the COPS Team with Parole Compliance checks in Malibu, Topanga, Calabasas and Westlake Village.
11. We Investigated 4 allegation of child abuse.
12. We registered 3 sex offenders.
13. We assisted STAR Deputies with summer camp at Calamigos Ranch for last two weeks of July.
14. We investigated an internet rumor about a "Project X" party being held in Malibu at a secret location.
15. We investigated a report of unlawful sex between two underage Malibu residents.
16. We assisted D.C.F.S. with enforcement of a court order re: a Malibu family.


- Worked DUI enforcement in the city of Malibu.
- Worked on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July parade permit and worked the parade.
- Went to Malibu city hall a several times to meet and talk with city staff to talk about what the current needs and concerns of the city are.
- Monitored 4th of July special events, large parties, and valet parker's for illegal parking, lane blocking and holiday traffic issues.
- Picked up, programmed and placed 3 CMS programmable sign trailers in Malibu near Zuma beach for holiday traffic safety and control.
- Worked with the J-Team regarding information I received about a large tarped area that juveniles had cleared and put up a shelter in the hills above Calabasas. This tent was used by juveniles to hang out in and smoke marijuana. This area was in a very dry brush high fire danger area. The J-Team removed it on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July weekend.
- Worked with the Malibu City Hall staff and the Malibu VOP'S to put together a Sheriff's room (for report writing, follow up phone calls, obtain report forms ,etc.) at Malibu City Hall.
- CIT Team is working to try to obtain more information on the very large "Project X" party secretly planned for an unknown location in Malibu.
- Called and went out to talk to both parties involved in an ongoing 415N at 25366 Malibu rd. at the request of Lt. Winslow. Deputies have responded over a dozen times in the last 12 months.
- Assisted traffic investigators with traffic control at the scene of an auto vs pedestrian fatal crash on PCH at El Matador St Beach. Assisted with documenting the scene.
- Assisted station detectives regarding doing follow up contact with a 459 to a house victim at 27901 PCH. I also checked the area and talked with workers in the area to see if I could locate any possible witnesses.
- Malibu City Hall meetings and Malibu Public Safety meeting.
- Working with and meetings with L.A. Co. Board of Supervisor, CART, City of Malibu and OPCC regarding putting together some type of handouts or fliers (Malibu Homeless Resource Guide) to pass out to the homeless letting them know about the programs the county has available to them.
- Attended CART meetings and assisted as need to help CART and the BOS in obtaining housing, food, shelter and transportation for the homeless in the Malibu and Topanga areas. So far one of the Malibu homeless (Nancy) has obtained a low income housing residence in the Warner Center area.

- Went out to Malibu to check on new homeless encampments that residents had reported to me, both camps were unoccupied at the time. I forwarded my findings to deputy Treinen.


