Although no action may be taken, the Commission and staff will follow up, at an appropriate time, on those items needing response. Each speaker is limited to (3) three minutes. Time may be surrendered by deferring (1) one minute to another speaker, not to exceed a total of (8) eight minutes. The speaker wishing to defer time must be present when the item is heard. In order to be recognized and present an item, each speaker must complete and submit to the Recording Secretary a Request to Speak form prior to the beginning of the item being announced by

the Chair (forms are available at the entrance to the meeting room). Speakers are taken in the order slips are submitted.

Chair Randall called the meeting to order at 5:31 p.m.

**ROLL CALL**

**PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE**

Commissioner Parks led the Pledge of Allegiance.

**APPROVAL OF AGENDA**

MOTION Vice Chair Petretti moved and Commissioner Parks seconded a motion to approve the agenda. The motion carried 4-0, Commissioner Principe absent.

**REPORT ON POSTING OF AGENDA**

Recording Secretary Odello reported that the agenda for the meeting was properly posted on August 11, 2016.

Theresa Odello, Recreation Coordinator, presented an update on Malibu Senior Center programs, events, partnerships, and an attendance summary.

**ITEM 2. WRITTEN AND ORAL COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE PUBLIC**

**ITEM 3. CONSENT CALENDAR**

MOTION Vice Chair Petretti moved and Commissioner Israel seconded a motion to approve the Consent Calendar. The motion carried unanimously.

**ITEM 4. OLD BUSINESS**

**ITEM 5. NEW BUSINESS**

- A. Malibu Bluffs Park Baseball Field Shade Structures  
Recommended action: Review designs and costs for baseball field shade structures at Malibu Bluffs Park and provide feedback to staff.

Recreation Manager Riesgo presented the report.

Commissioner Parks stated that the shade structure designs were more elaborate than necessary, especially with the possibility of the re-development of the park.

By consensus, the Commission directed Recreation Manager Riesgo to review and report additional shade options that are less expensive or that may be removed and reused at another park. Shade is needed over the baseball field bleachers, snack shack area, and the playground.

**ITEM 6. STAFF UPDATES**

Recreation Manager Riesgo presented the report, which included:

- The City Manager will be meeting with the Coastal Commission on August 23, 2016 to discuss the Malibu Bluffs Regional Parkland Project.
- Reseeding and turf maintenance was completed at Malibu Bluffs Park, Multipurpose Field on August 12, 2016.
- City Council directed staff to hire a contractor to install wire mesh on all of the temporary structures at Malibu Bluffs Park. The wire mesh was installed on August 12, 2016.

- Legacy Park Volunteer Day occurred on August 13, 2016. Volunteers from the Malibu Monarch Society assisted the City with pulling nonnative plants at the park. The next event will take place September 10, 2016 in conjunction with Pepperdine University's Step Forward Day.
- Summer Camps concluded the week of August 8, 2016. Staff will present a program summary at the October Commission Meeting.
- The Department will continue the afterschool enrichment program at Point Dume Marine Science School. Fall programs include Math Magic, Rocket Science and Astronomy, Creative Sculpture, Super Soccer Stars, and Watercolor Painting.
- The 2016 fall Recreation Guide and City Newsletter was mailed to homes on August 15, 2016. Fall programs will begin the last two weeks of September.
- The temporary art installation, Funny Zoo, will conclude on September 2, 2016 at Malibu Bluffs Park and December 17, 2016 at Legacy Park. The Cultural Arts Commission are reviewing options for a new art installation for the upcoming season.
- Upcoming special events include: CineMalibu, *Finding Nemo* on August 27, 2016; Cars and Coffee on August 28, 2016; and Tiny Tot Olympics on September 18, 2016.

#### **ITEM 7. COMMISSIONER COMMENTS**

Vice Chair Petretti complimented staff on organizing and managing the programs offered at the Senior Center and the summer camps, especially surf camp. She updated the Commission on the City's recent purchase of 35 acres at Trancas Canyon Road and Pacific Coast Highway (Trancas Field). She stated she was interested to find out the City's plans for the land. She also stated she was saddened about the passing of former Parks and Recreation Director Bob Stallings.

Commissioner Parks expressed interest in the Parks and Recreation department reviewing options to install sunscreen dispensers at City parks. He also stated he would like the Commission to review memorial options for Bob Stallings.

Chair Randall recommended the Commission adjourn the meeting in memory of former Parks and Recreation Director Bob Stallings, stating that he accomplished a lot during his tenure as the Parks and Recreation Director.

By consensus, the Commission agreed to add the scheduled use of Trancas Canyon Park Multi-Purpose Field as an item on next month's agenda.



**DISCUSSION:** During the month of August 2016, the following activities, events, projects, and programs were coordinated by the Parks and Recreation Department:

## **RECREATION**

**Adult Sports:** The adult summer Softball League concluded on August 28 with a four team single elimination playoff. The league champions received a commemorative plaque and personalized championship t-shirts. All of the teams had a great season and anticipate to play in the fall league beginning on September 18.

**Aquatics:** Summer programming at the Malibu Community Pool concluded on August 14. During the ten week summer schedule the following programs took place: Aqua Aerobics, Swim Lessons, Water Polo, Pre-Swim Team Clinic and recreation lap swimming. The nine week session of swim lessons had a total attendance of 174 participants ranging from 18 months to 13 years old.

The Malibu Seawolves Swim Team held a pre-season clinic at the Malibu Community Pool Monday through Thursday, August 22 to September 1. Forty-six participants ages 6 to 15 attended the clinic and had an opportunity to meet Markus Rogan, a two-time Olympic silver medalist and Ed Moses, Olympic Gold Medal winner who signed autographs and offered some insight into their Olympic experiences.

Community Classes: Summer Community Classes concluded the week of August 29 with an increase of 30% in attendance compared to the summer 2015 season. The Parent and Me Class, Music Together, was the most popular class of the summer with 19 child participants (39 total participants, including parents). Music Together will be offered during the fall season along with Kick and Play, Parent and Me Ballet and a newly added cooking class with the company Creative Plate. New adult Community Classes include: Guitar, Mandolin & Ukulele, Creative Nature Journaling, Clay Sculpting, Expressive Yoga and Cardio Kickboxing.

In an effort to increase awareness of the Department's recreation classes, all independent contract instructors were provided a letter outlining opportunities to market their programs within the City of Malibu. They were encouraged to interact with community members, attend local events, conduct demonstrations at the local schools and the library, post flyers on community boards and advertise on social media.

On August 5, participants at the Succulent Terrarium Orb workshop learned how to create and care for succulents with instructor, Mattie Garske.

Day Camps: The City offered a variety of enrichment, sports, surf, music and technology camps during the 2016 season. Forty-two day camps were offered and of those, thirty-one camps successfully occurred; a program success rate of 74%. In total, 1,506 children participated in the eight week program in comparison to the 2,004 participants that participated in the ten week program in 2015. Due to the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District's academic calendar and Independence Day, the camp season was reduced by two weeks in 2016.

Point Dume Marine Science School After-School Enrichment Program: Recreation staff attended Back to School Night at Point Dume Marine Science School on August 30 to promote upcoming programs and acquire parent feedback for future classes. Super Soccer Stars instructors were also present to promote their program that takes place on Tuesday afternoons.

Teens: The Park and Recreation Department hosted an interactive booth at Malibu High School School's Get Your Stuff Day on August 15 and 16 to market upcoming programs including: middle school sports, workshops, aquatic and teen programs. The astronomy-themed booth included a giant spinning wheel, school supply give-a-ways and a sampling of astronaut ice cream.

Senior Center: Two excursions were offered during the month of August: the Ventura County Fair on August 9 and Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) on August 23.

The monthly Silver Fox Walk was combined with the Locals Lunch program which began at the Sarah Wan Trail and ended with lunch at Malibu Seafood.

“Navigating the Financial and Legal Maze of Senior Funding and Long Term Care” was the topic of the free monthly lecture, Finance Friday. The lecture was presented by Senior Living Advisor Lin Hammer and Elder Law Attorney Gerald Kane.

Eighty people attended the Center’s monthly luncheon catered by Wood Ranch and entertainment was provided by LA Virtuosi. Seniors enjoyed a wonderful performance in the theatre with classical musicians playing the violin, saxophone, flute and piano.

The Virtual Dementia Tour was held on August 22 which gave participants a chance to walk in the shoes of someone with dementia. It was a moving experience for participants and most people felt they had a better understanding of how dementia affects a person after they completed the tour. The free event was provided by HomeWatch Caregivers of Thousand Oaks.

August was movie month at the Senior Center with over 65 people in attendance. The movies featured included: *My Big Fat Greek Wedding 2*, *Hail, Caesar!*, *Amy*, *The Heart of the Sea*, *Dark Passage*, and *It Happened One Night*.

The first two rehearsals of the new Malibu Jazz Ensemble were held on August 24 and 31 in the Civic Theater. The community jazz band welcomes all interested players and plans to perform at occasional community events such as the City’s Winter Showcase in December. A picture is included below of the rehearsal.



Special Events: CineMalibu took place on August 27 at Malibu Bluffs Park with 200 people in attendance who watched the movie, *Finding Nemo*. Vendors from Heal the Bay, Creative Plate, and a character from Fairy Tale Entertainment provided activities and information for attendees. The next movie in the park will take place on October 21 in conjunction with the Youth Commission’s Haunted Maze.

Cars and Coffee was held on August 14 and August 28 at Malibu Bluffs Park with more than 100 people in attendance at each event.

## **PARK MAINTENANCE**

Bluffs Park: The temporary fencing installed in July to prevent unauthorized access on the multipurpose field during the turf renovation establishment period was removed on August 12 and the field was reopened for public use.

Repairs were completed on a drinking fountain near the Whale's Tail due to a leak within the mainline beneath the concrete pad. Staff was able to repair the broken line without breaking the concrete by digging a trench to the repair area.

A wire mesh was installed around the perimeter of the snack bar, two little league storage containers and the recreation storage unit to prevent ground squirrels from burrowing underneath these areas and inhabiting the space.

Michael Landon Center: Due to a misalignment between a newly installed toilet and the main drain, pipe maintenance was completed on the drain gaskets that were not sealing properly and were leaking. In order to fix the leak, a part of the wall will be cut out so the toilet can be raised and realigned with the drain pipe.

Legacy Park: An overgrowth of reeds and cattails were removed from Legacy Park's detention basin. Water may now move freely between the creek bed, detention basin, drain and recirculation pump station. By maintaining the appropriate amount of water movement and circulation, it becomes inhospitable for mosquito larva to inhabit the water.

Trancas Canyon Park: An additional water line was added from the mainline inside the restroom pipe chase and extended towards the exterior of the building where a new spigot was installed. The newly installed spigot will be used by the contractor that services the septic system at the park so staff will no longer have to be onsite to assist the service contractor with accessing the building.


The drinking fountain located inside the dog park was occasionally overflowing due to a drain blockage. The blockage was cleared of dog hair and dirt and is now working properly.

EQUESTRIAN PARK: A faulty valve on the drinking fountain, caused by an adjustment mechanism, was repaired. The malfunction made it impossible to make adjustments to generate the appropriate flow of water for use by visitors. The fountain is now functioning appropriately with the adjustments in place.

Due to intermittent exterior lighting failures on the restroom building, two new light fixtures were installed to provide custodial staff with lighting during their facility cleanings.

Shrubs and debris were removed from the V-ditch along the east side of the upper arena to maintain the park's proper appearance.

Subject: Malibu Bluffs Park Shade Structures

**RECOMMENDED ACTION:** Review designs and costs for shade structures at Malibu Bluffs Park and provide feedback to staff.

**DISCUSSION:** On October 20, 2015, Commissioner Parks requested the Parks and Recreation Director review the options of adding shade structures above the baseball field bleachers at Malibu Bluffs Park. The prices and options for shade structures was presented at the Parks and Recreation Commission Regular Meeting on August 16, 2016.

The Commission determined the price was too high and requested staff to research additional shade options at the following locations at Malibu Bluffs Park: baseball field bleachers, snack shack picnic tables and the playground area near the Michael Landon Center.

The Commission also requested staff to review options to use the current poles that hold the netting above the baseball field bleachers and options to remove a shade structure and place it in another park.


Staff met with a contractor from Landscape Structures, Inc. The contractor proposed installing permanent umbrella-type shade, or a single-post pyramid structure, at the playground and snack shack picnic tables. The contractor also suggested installing a cantilever canopy, at the baseball field bleachers that would sustain winds up to 105 miles per hour.

Due to safety industry standards and engineering specifications, he confirmed that he would not be able to use the existing poles near the baseball field bleachers that


currently hold the nylon netting. City Engineers also determined that installation of fabric to the existing poles and backstop would be a liability and did not recommend installing any type of fabric to them, even if it were to be removed each day.

The contractor also reported that shade structures had the potential to be removed and installed at other parks, but the cost of removal and re-installation would need to be considered. More than likely, the posts would have to be replaced, but the fabric shade could be reused and has a lifespan of 5-8 years.

Below are shade design examples of the cantilever canopy and single-post pyramid structure. The cost of installation will vary depending on the ground excavation and the depth in which the contractor can dig below ground (attachment 1). Examples of the two shade types are included for the Commission's review.



**RECOMMENDED ACTION:** At the direction of the City Council: 1) Consider a public outreach plan to solicit input for uses at Trancas Field; 2) Provide a recommendation to the City Council on the public outreach plan; and 3) Add this as a task to the Commission's Fiscal Year 2016-2017 Work Plan.

**DISCUSSION:** On August 8, 2016, the Council approved the purchase of approximately 35 acres located at Trancas Canyon Road and Pacific Coast Highway, commonly known as Trancas Field.

On September 12, 2016, the City Council discussed potential uses for Trancas Field, including the development of a world-class skate park, and directed the Parks and Recreation Commission to develop a public outreach plan to solicit input for uses at Trancas Field.

In 2014, the Council adopted a Parks Needs Assessment (attached) that determined recreational needs and priorities in Malibu. As part of the Commission's task of developing a public outreach plan, the Council directed that the Parks Needs Assessment be reviewed and, if necessary, be updated to include the Trancas Field site.

Trancas Field presents an array of opportunities; however, there are some constraints on the site to be considered. The site has a large sloped area and Environmentally Sensitive Habitat Areas (ESHA) that are not suitable for development. Additionally, the road access is off of Trancas Canyon; therefore, ingress and egress must be carefully reviewed. The Commission should consider requesting a report from the Planning Department on any constraints.

The City has received a generous donation pledge of \$1 million from the Strange family who would like to honor their late son Johnny Strange by donating funds to help construct a world-class skate park in Malibu. One of the issues for the Commission to consider as the public outreach plan is developed is how quickly a world-class skate park could be designed and built, as the Strange family has asked for their contribution to be put to use as soon as possible.

The City Council will concurrently establish a Blue Ribbon Committee to develop a design model for the skate park that would be included in the Request for Proposals for design services.

In order to provide a thorough recommendation to the City Council, the public outreach plan should include scheduling several community meetings to solicit public opinion: One meeting to be held on the west side of Malibu, one meeting in the Civic Center area, and a follow-up meeting for the Commission to deliberate on the priorities raised in the community meetings. These meetings should be scheduled in a timely manner in order to provide a recommendation back to the City Council no later than early 2017.

After considering the above listed tasks, the Commission should provide a recommendation back to the City Council that includes a detailed timeline, meeting schedule and other required elements.

2.2.16 NEED FOR PARKS AND RECREATION FACILITIES




Figure 12 - Need for Parks and Recreation Facilities

The parks and recreation facilities that the highest percentage of households has a need for are walking, biking trails and greenways (73%), small neighborhood parks (61%), small family picnic areas and shelters (51%), large community parks (50%) and multi-generational community center (46%) as shown in **Figure 12**.




Figure 13 - Need for Parks and Recreation Facilities in Malibu
