Guide to the City Council Proceedings and Decorum

Public Communications: Each speaker is limited to three (3) minutes. Members of the public may speak during the meeting in-person or through the Zoom application, although it is strongly recommended that those who wish to participate do so in person. While the City intends to allow zoom participation, the meeting will not be cancelled or continued if technical difficulties impact the ability to accept public comment over Zoom. In order to participate remotely, you must be present in the Zoom Webinar during the item that you would like to speak on and use the Raise Hand feature to request to speak when the Mayor calls the item. In order to participate in-person, each speaker must complete and submit to the Recording Secretary a Request to Speak form *prior* to the beginning of the item being announced by the Mayor. In-person participants may surrender their time by deferring one (1) minute to another in-person speaker, not to exceed a total of eight (8) minutes. The speaker wishing to defer time must be present when the item is heard and their form must be submitted with the speaker form for the individual they are deferring time to. Speakers are taken in the order slips are submitted or hands are raised.

On specific agenda items Councilmembers may question any person addressing the City Council at the conclusion of all public testimony on that agenda item before the Council. Councilmembers shall not engage any member of the public in a dialogue with themselves other Councilmembers, city staff or other members of the public.

Role of the Presiding Officer: The presiding officer of the City Council, who shall be the Mayor, shall be responsible for maintaining the order and decorum of meetings. It shall be the duty of the presiding officer to ensure that these rules of procedure and decorum are followed at all times. The presiding officer shall maintain control of communication between Councilmembers, between the Council and the public, and chair each meeting in a fair and impartial manner. It shall be the duty of each Councilmember to support the presiding officer in maintaining the order and decorum of Council meetings.

Members of the Audience: Members of the audience shall not engage in disorderly or boisterous conduct, including clapping, whistling, stamping of feet, or other acts which disturb, disrupt, impede or otherwise disturb the orderly conduct of the City Council meeting. Persons addressing the City Council shall not engage in disorderly conduct which disrupts, or otherwise impedes the orderly conduct or Council meetings. Any person who so disrupts a Council meeting may, at the discretion of the presiding officer or a majority of the City Council, be subject to ejection from that meeting.

No new items will be taken-up after 10:30 p.m. without a two-thirds vote of the City Council.







REGULAR SESSION CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Riggins called the meeting to order at 6:05 p.m.

ROLL CALL

CLOSED SESSION REPORT

Interim City Attorney Rusin reported that the meeting convened at 4:30 p.m., after which time the City Council recessed to a Closed Session pursuant to Government Code Section 54956.9, with all Councilmembers present. He stated the Council discussed the items on the Closed Session agenda and took no reportable action on items one and two. He noted Mayor Pro Tem Silverstein recused from third item and reported that by a vote of 4-0, Mayor Pro Tem Silverstein recused, the Council provided direction to initiate an action, and that action, the defendants and other particulars shall, once formally commenced be disclosed to any person upon inquiry, unless to do so would jeopardize the City's ability to effectuate service of process on one or more unserved parties, or to do so would jeopardize the City's ability to conclude existing settlement negotiations to its advantage.

REPORT ON POSTING OF AGENDA

City Clerk Pettijohn reported that the agenda for the meeting was properly posted on June 13, 2025, with the amended agenda posted on June 20, 2025.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

MOTION Councilmember Uhring moved, and Mayor Pro Tem Silverstein seconded a motion to approve the agenda, hearing Item No. 6.A. after 6:30 p.m. or after ceremonial items, whichever is earlier. The motion carried unanimously.

Mayor Riggins opened the floor to public comment on the Consent Calendar.

Jo Drummond provided public comment on Item No. 1.B.7.

Item No. 1.B.8. was pulled by the Council.

MOTION Councilmember Uhring moved, and Councilmember Stewart seconded a motion to approve the Consent Calendar, pulling Item No. 1.B.8. The motion carried unanimously.

The Council discussed the item and directed questions to staff.

MOTION

Councilmember Uhring moved, and Councilmember Stewart seconded a motion to authorize the Mayor to execute Amendment No. 1 to the Professional Services Agreement with California Strategies & Advocacy, LLC (Calstrat) for government relations and lobbying services extending the term of the Agreement to expire June 30, 2026. The motion carried unanimously.

ITEM 2 CEREMONIAL/PRESENTATIONS

A. Proclamation Declaring July 2025 as Parks and Recreation Month in the City of Malibu

Mayor Riggins presented the proclamation to Community Services Director Riesgo.

B. Presentation from the U.S. Small Business Administration

Corey Williams, U.S. Small Business Administration Public Information Officer, provided a presentation on the Economic Injury Disaster Loan program for Palisades Fire recovery.

ITEM 6 OLD BUSINESS

A. Pacific Coast Highway Pavement Rehabilitation Projects

Recommended Action: Receive presentation on the Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) Pavement Rehabilitation Projects by Caltrans.

Nancy Pe, Caltrans District 7 Assistant Division Chief for Project/Program Management, presented the report.

The Council directed questions to staff and Caltrans.

Mayor Riggins opened the floor to public comment.

Speakers: Scott Dittrich, Ryan Embree, Jo Drummond

As there were no other speakers present, Mayor Riggins returned the matter to the table for discussion.

The Council discussed the item and directed questions to staff and Caltrans.

CONSENSUS

By consensus, the Council directed staff to bring back recommendations from the Public Works Commission on street lighting fixtures in alignment with the dark skies.

ITEM 3 COMMISSION / COMMITTEE / CITY MANAGER UPDATES

Scott Dittrich, Public Works Commission, discussed a presentation from their last meeting on the Big Rock landslide and clarified that it was not an active landslide and was on pause contingent on continuing dewatering measures.

Pamela Conley Ulich, Malibu Arts Commission, discussed plans for a 24,000 square-foot performing arts center and announced a public and stakeholder input meeting scheduled for July 30, 2025 at 6:00 p.m. She stated that a year of love, hope, and healing event was being planned and requested the City consider coordinating with the group to use Legacy Park as the venue.

Interim City Manager Bond announced Governor Newsome issued an emergency proclamation on June 18, 2025 authorizing the Governor's Office of Emergency Services (CalOES) assistance to the City of Malibu for the December 2024 Franklin Fire, and assistance and tax benefits for residents impacted by the fire. She reported that she attended the June 20, 2025 Blue Ribbon Commission on Climate Action and Fire Safe Recovery with Mayor Riggins and Councilmembers Conrad and Stewart and discussed the recommendations from the Commission's report. She announced the Community Development Department (CDD) partnership with State and philanthropic organizations including LA Rises, Steadfast LA, and Southern California Grantmakers, along with Los Angeles County, Los Angeles City, and technology partner Archistar on a new digital platform design to support communities in the rebuilding process providing rebuilding tools. She announced new Planning, Building Safety, and Environmental Services public counter hours of operation from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday effective June 30, 2025. She congratulated Community Development Department Director Bundy and her team on their achievement of receiving the California Resource Recovery Association environmental award for their construction, demolition, and recycling program. She stated that staff met with Rebuild Ambassador Abe Roy and toured fire damaged sites. She reported updated fire rebuild permit statistics. She stated

12 automated license plate reader cameras were installed in partnership with L.A. County Sheriff Department to improve public safety. She reported that a temporary day use impound yard began operation at the Malibu High School parking lot on May 24, 2025. She discussed the independent after action review to be conducted of the City's emergency operations during the Franklin and Palisades fires. She reported that Southern California Edison announced a likely increase in Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) events and encouraged the public to register for emergency alerts. She announced 15 new Community Emergency Response Team members completed training. She encouraged the public to contact the City's Fire Safety Liaisons and the City's website for property brush clearance guidance and schedule free home wildfire assessment. She encouraged residents to contact Fire Safety Liaison Gabriel Etcheverry for assistance with replacement of worn or missing blue reflective fire hydrant street markers. She stated that Covered6 continued private security patrols in the fire damaged areas. She encouraged participation in the City's summer youth camp program. She announced the Pride flag would be displayed at City Hall during June's Pride Month. She announced Malibu Arts Commission's June 24, 2025 meeting scheduled for 9:30 a.m. at City Hall, Environmental Review Board's June 25, 2025 virtual meeting at 9:00 a.m., and Public Work Commission June 25, 2025 3:30 p.m. meeting at City Hall. She announced a Ghost Tire memorial service would be held on Saturday, June 28, 2025 for Eddy Buddy Rivera IV, who tragically lost his life at 26 years old on January 26, 2025 in an incident on PCH.

Sergeant Chris Soderlund, Los Angeles County Sheriff Department, discussed significant incidents in June 2025, including an arrest for attempted murder at Zuma Beach on June 15, 2025, and an arrest for attempted robbery on June 19, 2025 that occurred at 22700 block of PCH. He discussed plans for summer operations including the July 4 Point Dume parade, the beach team beginning full time operations the coming week. He announced LAPD Sergeant Shou Deng passed in the line of duty earlier in the day.

ITEM 4.A. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Anne Payne announced a fund raiser concert on Sunday, July 6, 2025 at Pepperdine University Smothers Theater to support the Our Lady of Malibu Fire Relief Fund.

Ella Stabile discussed the Malibu High School vandalism incident and apologized on behalf of the students opposed to the destructive prank. She stated the incident was organized by a small group of students and as the 25-26 Senior Class President she would work with the student body on appropriate pranks for the next senior class.

Anne K. discussed her proposal for a press pool video and audio system for City meetings.

Jo Drummond discussed false and defamatory statements and requested Council take stronger steps to protect the integrity of public dialog during City meetings by

requiring virtual participants to be shown on camera.

Victoria Franklin-Dilba discussed her house destroyed by the Palisades Fire and the high costs of rebuilding. She stated that the rebuild center was helpful. She recommended the Council waive rebuild permit fees.

Roxanne Franklin-White discussed the high costs of rebuilding and how recovery will change the community. She requested clarity on rebuilding requirements and fee waivers.

Wade Major discussed Small Business Administration loans and the challenges for individuals with freelance incomes to qualify for those loans. He discussed the infeasibility of Caltrans plans for bike lanes on PCH.

Scott Dittrich discussed increased business at Malibu Seafood over the weekend. He discussed an anonymous letter sent to the residents criticizing Councilmember Uhring and Mayor Pro Tem Silverstein. He discussed challenges residents encountered rebuilding and those whose homes did not burn but were affected to the point that they were unlivable without remediation. He requested the Council request assistance from the Governor to allow rebuilds not to be classified as new construction for wastewater and building code.

Ryan Embree discussed the water main on PCH that limits water flow and recommended the pipeline be replaced while utilities are reconstructed and undergrounded. He mentioned that there was a power outage during the last Planning Commission meeting in western Malibu which prevented resident participation. He stated that SCE's PSPS program was implemented seven years prior as a temporary measure while they hardened their network. He recommended the City's lobbyist advocate for SCE to make better progress and for an exemption from bike lanes on PCH. He recommended forming a telecom and technology commission.

Darren Graves discussed the Local Agency Management Plan and the definition of "new construction" in that agreement and unnecessary septic upgrade requirements. He announced an open community rebuilding and fire hardening event at the library. He stated the bike paths on PCH should not be changed by Caltrans

ITEM 4.B. SUBCOMMITTEE REPORTS / COUNCIL COMMENTS

Councilmember Uhring confirmed the Council had directed staff to bring back a resolution to waive rebuild permit fees. He discussed SCE plans to increase PSPS events and the impacts on public safety. He discussed the shortage of day workers available for hire in relation to recent Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) activities.

Councilmember Conrad stated she had been working with a group of residents on ways to support seniors in emergencies and PSPS events. She proposed reforming

the Telecommunications Commission. She requested consensus to require Zoom participants to enable their cameras when speaking during public meetings. She discussed having Commission meetings recorded. She discussed a healing and love event that was being organized.

In response to Councilmember Conrad, Community Services Director Riesgo stated that after the fire, an assessment of the sycamore trees at Las Flores Park was conducted and it was determined that the trees would not recover and needed to be removed for safety reasons.

Councilmember Conrad reported that she attended her first Mountains Recreation Conservation Authority (MRCA) meeting.

Councilmember Stewart thanked the Public Safety Department for the automatic license plate readers. He stated that the blue reflective fire hydrant indicator dots on streets were imperative to have installed and maintained and are available from the Public Safety Commission. He stated that the Public Works Commission is responsible for matters formerly under the Telecommunications Commission's purview. He commented on the importance of generator maintenance. He stated that changes were made to rebuild requirements removing some requirements and fee waivers in February, but building codes must still be met.

Mayor Pro Tem Silverstein stated that he and Mayor Riggins, as the rebuild ad hoc committee were working with residents on possible legislative initiatives. He commented on seeking clarification of septic system replacement requirements.

In response to Mayor Pro Tem Silverstein, City Clerk Pettijohn stated that the Council procedures item that was upcoming pertained to gaining feedback on the pilot Council meeting agenda reformatting, the hybrid meeting format, and other procedural matters the Council has brought up since its implementation.

Mayor Pro Tem Silverstein discussed an anonymous letter referring to a nonexistent impending Malibu bankruptcy that was mailed to residents, misquoting him as stating he would never vote for a new permit.

Mayor Riggins discussed the letter and stated that she felt the correlations expressed in the letter stating the finances of the City were in jeopardy sent an irresponsible message. She encouraged the public to do their own investigation about the health of the City's budget. She stated that she was proud of how well the City was able to function financially despite the emergencies, due to its fiscally conservative practices.

In response to Mayor Riggins, Community Development Director Bundy stated the counters would have lunch closure from 12:00-1:30 on Wednesday.

Mayor Riggins reminded the public to have front license plates installed. She complimented the City Manager Newsletter and encouraged the public to sign up

to receive the informative publication. She reminded the public to be certain to park legally during the upcoming Point Dume 4th of July parade.

In response to Mayor Riggins, City Clerk Pettijohn clarified that the adjournment of the June 5, 2025 Public Safety Commission meeting was properly posted.

Mayor Riggins encouraged agencies involved in the PSPS events to ensure all safety measures are taken. She requested that internet providers provide community training on how to connect their internet modem to a generator during outages. She clarified that it was the State Water Resources Control Board, not Water District 29, that determined whether a new septic system was required for a rebuild. She invited communication on the community's specific needs for rebuilding that were not being satisfied.

Mayor Pro Tem Silverstein recommended residents with issues rebuilding approach the Rebuild Ambassador.

Interim City Manager Bond confirmed staff was meeting weekly with the Rebuild Ambassador to discuss rebuild issues.

Councilmember Uhring stated that SCE indicated that the PSPS events would be more frequent and last longer.

Councilmember Stewart commented on the challenges presented by attempting to keep the more than twenty-one traffic lights functioning during power outages. He stated that rebuild requests to the state should be revisited. He stated that people had a right to speak, and the Council had the right to rebut.

Mayor Pro Tem Silverstein suggested considering reordering the agenda.

RECESS At 9:07 p.m., Mayor Riggins recessed the meeting. The meeting resumed at 9:22 p.m. with all Councilmembers present.

Mayor Riggins opened the floor for the public comment portion of the public hearing. As there were no speakers present, Mayor Riggins closed the public hearing and returned the matter to the table for discussion.

MOTION Councilmember Uhring moved, and Mayor Pro Tem Silverstein seconded a motion to adopt Resolution No. 25-32 levying an assessment for the maintenance, repair and improvements works, systems and facilities of Assessment District 98-2 (Calle Del Barco) for Fiscal Year 2025-2026. The motion carried unanimously.

The Council discussed the matter and directed questions to staff.

Subject: Resolution Extending the Declaration of the Existence of a Local Emergency Regarding Conditions on Pacific Coast Highway (PCH)

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Adopt Resolution No. 26-02 extending the declaration of the existence of a local emergency related to the increase of reckless and illegal driving on Pacific Coast Highway and directing staff to coordinate efforts with other governmental agencies to increase attention and create programs to reduce the risk and danger associated with Pacific Coast Highway in the City.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no fiscal impact associated with the recommended action.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY: This item is part of the day-to-day operations identified in the Adopted FY 2024-25 Strategic Priority Project List.

DISCUSSION: On November 13, 2023, the Council adopted Resolution No. 23-52 declaring the existence of a local emergency in response to increasing reckless and illegal driving on PCH. The Council last reviewed and extended this declaration November 24, 2025.

The California Emergency Service Act allows the City to proclaim a local state of emergency when needed to protect the public safety in dire circumstances. The status and use of Pacific Coast Highway (“PCH”) currently constitutes a condition, or threatened condition, of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the City of Malibu. PCH is the City’s main thoroughfare, and each day serves as a commuting route, a residential street, a business corridor, and for persons accessing beaches and other local recreation amenities, a pathway used by pedestrians and cyclists. PCH is a California State Highway (State Route 1) that is managed and maintained by the California Department of Transportation (“Caltrans”) with a posted speed limit ranging between 45-55 miles per hour in the City. Excessive speeding, reckless driving, unsafe U-turns, and

distracted driving caused by cell phone use and other distractions have resulted in increased collisions with other motorists, cyclists and pedestrians on PCH that have resulted in injury and death.

According to data from the Statewide Integrated Traffic Records System obtained through UC Berkley's Transportation Injury mapping system, between 2018 and 2022, there were 22 deadly crashes on PCH in the City, resulting in the death of 23 people. Data from the California Highway Patrol indicates that there have been 49 fatalities along PCH in Malibu from 2012-22. And finally, the Los Angeles Times has reported that there have been 170 combined deaths and serious injuries to drivers, passengers, cyclists, and pedestrians between 2011 and 2023 along PCH in the City. Further, countless other close calls or near misses from the danger posed by the conduct on PCH are impossible to quantify. Most recently, a crash occurred on PCH resulting in the tragic and unnecessary loss of four Pepperdine University students who were walking along PCH. According to authorities, the driver of the car was allegedly traveling at a speed in excess of 100 miles per hour when his vehicle lost control, sideswiped at least three parked cars, and then crashed into a group of people including the four Pepperdine University students and two others.

These statistics and the most recent tragedy are all consistent with the day-to-day experience of City residents, visitors, officials, and staff. PCH has become increasingly dangerous to residents and visitors due to the common occurrence of drivers speeding, driving recklessly, or driving while distracted. Residents and visitors are now forced to weigh and modify their use of PCH depending on the time of day and other factors (*e.g.*, weather, weekend vs. weekday, existing traffic conditions, *etc.*) because of the danger posed. Despite efforts by the City and other governmental agencies to improve the safety of PCH, the point has been reached that the risk is just too great. The status quo is no longer acceptable, and action must be taken to mitigate this local emergency.

Safety on PCH is a problem that the City cannot address and fix alone. It will need to work with Caltrans to make changes to PCH itself. PCH is a State Highway managed and controlled by Caltrans. Sections 83 and 90 of the Street and Highways Code state that Caltrans has jurisdiction, possession, control and responsibility for the maintenance of State Highways. Further sections of the Streets and Highways Code make clear that Caltrans is the entity with decision-making power over PCH in the City, including improvements, safety elements and speed limits. Further, Streets and Highway Code section 124 states that it is Caltrans, not the City, that can restrict the use of, or close, a State Highway for the protection of the public.

Furthermore, law enforcement agencies such as the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department (LASD) and the California Highway Patrol have enforcement jurisdiction over PCH for Vehicle Code violations and other code violations. Given its enforcement jurisdiction over PCH, the City can also work through the LASD to address vehicle code violations and related enforcement action. To effectively effect change, the City must

coordinate and work together with its other governmental partners to implement strategies and solutions to reduce the danger on PCH for all users.

California Government Code Section 8630 empowers the City Council to proclaim the existence of a Local Emergency when there is extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the territorial limits of the City. Additionally, California Government Code section 8634 empowers the City Council to promulgate orders and regulations necessary to provide for the protection of life and property during the time of a Local Emergency. These statutes codify the constitutional “police powers” of local governments to adopt local legislation designed to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the community. Further, the City’s Municipal Code (Chapter 2.52) establishes the City’s disaster council and policies and procedures for dealing with a local emergency. The City’s purchasing ordinance (Chapter 2.56) allows for greater flexibility when making purchases for supplies or services in response to a local emergency. Thus, a declaration of local emergency provides the City greater flexibility to act expediently when trying to address and mitigate the danger posed by the local emergency. It may also aid in coordination with other governmental entities and allow the City access to other resources.

Government Code Section 8630 requires that the City Council review the need for continuing a local emergency at least once every 60 days until the City Council terminates the local emergency.

As such, City staff recommend adopting Resolution No. 25-47 extending the declaration of the existence of a local emergency. If adopted, the City Council will review, and as needed renew, this action at least every 60 days.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW:

This resolution and the actions taken and/or proposed herein are not a project pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) since they are activities that are excluded from the definition of a project by section 21065 of the California Public Resources Code and section 15378(b) of the State CEQA Guidelines. The proposed actions are organizational or administrative activities of government which will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment. These actions are also exempt from CEQA as specific actions necessary to prevent or mitigate an emergency pursuant to section 21080(b)(4) and section 15269(c) of the State CEQA Guidelines. They also are exempt under CEQA Guidelines Section 15301 – existing facilities. Coordinating and improving infrastructure and safety as well as education and enforcement efforts for safer driving and use of PCH are all exempt activities. Further, to the extent there are minor/temporary uses of land having a negligible or no permanent effect on the environment, these activities are exempt under Section 15304(e) of the CEQA Guidelines.

RESOLUTION NO. 26-02

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MALIBU EXTENDING THE DECLARATION OF THE EXISTENCE OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY RELATED TO THE INCREASE OF RECKLESS AND ILLEGAL DRIVING ON PACIFIC COAST HIGHWAY AND DIRECTING STAFF TO COORDINATE EFFORTS WITH OTHER GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES TO INCREASE ATTENTION AND CREATE PROGRAMS TO REDUCE THE RISK AND DANGER ASSOCIATED WITH PACIFIC COAST HIGHWAY IN THE CITY

The City Council of the City of Malibu does hereby find, order, and resolve as follows:

SECTION 1. Recitals.

- A. Condition or threatened conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property have arisen within the City of Malibu caused by the increase in reckless and illegal driving on Pacific Coast Highway (“PCH”) in the City. This reckless and illegal driving has led to increased collisions with other motorists, cyclists and pedestrians, resulting in injury and death.
- B. According to data from the Statewide Integrated Traffic Records System obtained through UC Berkeley’s Transportation Injury Mapping System, between 2018 and 2022 there were 22 deadly crashes on PCH in the City, resulting in the death of 23 people. According to data from the California Highway Patrol, there have been 49 fatalities along PCH through Malibu from 2012-22. According to the Los Angeles Times there have been 170 deaths and serious injuries to drivers, passengers, cyclists and pedestrians between 2011 and 2023.
- C. On October 17, 2023, a crash occurred in the 21500 block of PCH resulting in the tragic loss of four Pepperdine University Students who were walking along the road. According to authorities, the driver of the car was traveling at a speed in excess of 100 miles per hour when he lost control, sideswiped at least three parked cars and then crashed into a group of people including the four Pepperdine University Students and two others.
- D. PCH is a California State Highway managed and maintained by the California Department of Transportation (“Caltrans”). The posted speed limit along PCH in the City ranges between 45-55 miles per hour.
- E. PCH is the City’s main thoroughfare and serves as a commuting route, a residential street and business corridor in the City.
- F. City officials, City staff and City residents are tragically aware that PCH has become increasingly dangerous to residents, visitors and commuters, with drivers regularly exceeding the posted speed limits or driving recklessly or distracted which

has resulted in not only the killing and maiming of pedestrians, cyclists and other motorists, but a collective fear and trauma about the risks posed by accessing PCH.

- G. Despite efforts by the City and other governmental agencies to improve the safety of PCH, PCH continues to pose a threat to those who drive, walk and/or cycle along it. Serious and dangerous collisions continue to occur too regularly, with four additional fatalities since November 2023.
- H. California Government Code Section 8630 empowers the City Council to proclaim the existence of a Local Emergency when there is extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the territorial limits of the City. Additionally, California Government Code Section 8634 empowers the City Council to promulgate orders and regulations necessary to provide for the protection of life and property during the time of a Local Emergency. These statutes codify the constitutional “police powers” of local governments to adopt local legislation designed to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the community.

SECTION 2. It is hereby proclaimed that:

- A. The above recitals are true and correct.
- B. The increase in dangerous, illegal, reckless and/or distracted driving on PCH in the City currently poses extreme peril to persons and property in Malibu. As such, the City Council finds that the declaration of local emergency remains valid and necessary, and will remain in effect until the extreme danger has subsided.
- C. To reduce and prevent the risks associated with dangers posed on PCH, City staff are directed to coordinate with Caltrans, the Los Angeles County Sheriff, the California Highway Patrol, and other entities and government agencies to implement programs, increase enforcement of existing laws and/or develop solutions to reduce the danger on PCH to pedestrians, cyclists and other motorists from dangerous, illegal, reckless and/or distracted driving on PCH.
- D. The City Director of Emergency Services, or designee, is directed and authorized to address any and all impacts and conditions caused by the emergency and to obtain any and all aid and assistance from local, county, state, or federal agencies, including but not limited to aid and assistance pursuant to the California Disaster Assistance Act, California Government Code Section 8690 *et. seq.*
- E. The City Manager, as the Purchasing Officer of the City pursuant to Malibu Municipal Code Section 2.56.070(C), is authorized to make purchases of supplies or services exceeding twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) in compliance with Malibu Municipal Code, Chapter 2.56.

- F. City staff are directed to report back to the City Council regarding programs and strategies proposed or implemented to mitigate the risk associated with this local emergency.

SECTION 3. The local emergency shall be deemed to continue and exist until its termination is proclaimed by the City Council. As required by law, the City Council shall review the need to continue the state of emergency every 60 days until this resolution is terminated.

SECTION 4. This resolution and the actions taken and/or proposed herein are not a project pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) since they are activities that are excluded from the definition of a project by section 21065 of the California Public Resources Code and section 15378(b) of the State CEQA Guidelines. The proposed actions are organizational or administrative activities of government which will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment. In the alternative, find that the actions are exempt from CEQA as specific actions necessary to prevent or mitigate an emergency pursuant to section 21080(b)(4) and section 15269(c) of the State CEQA Guidelines.

SECTION 5. The City Clerk shall certify the passage and adoption of this resolution and enter it into the book of original resolutions.

Subject: Rejection of Bids for the Encinal Canyon Road 60-Inch Storm Drain Repairs Project

RECOMMENDED ACTION: 1) Reject all bids received for the Encinal Canyon Road 60-Inch Storm Drain Repairs Project (Project), Specification No. 2113; and 2) direct staff to revise scope of work required to repair the storm drain on Encinal Canyon Road and rebid the Project.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no fiscal impact associated with the recommended action.

STRATEGIC PLAN IMPLEMENTATION: N/A.

DISCUSSION: The 2022 Storm Drain Master Plan identified that an existing 60-inch Corrugated Metal Pipe (CMP) storm drain crossing Encinal Canyon Road was damaged and requires to be replaced. The CMP has deteriorated along the pipe invert due to age-related corrosion. The project improvements include installing a spiral wound polyvinyl chloride (PVC) pipe liner to restore the structural integrity and extend the service life of the pipe. This method was selected rather than excavating the roadway at a depth of 20-30 feet deep to replace the storm drain.

This Project was brought to Council on September 8, 2025. At this meeting, Council rejected all bids and directed staff to rebid the Project. On September 11, 2025, the final Project plans and specifications for the Encinal Canyon Road 60-Inch Storm Drain Repairs Project were re-advertised for formal competitive bidding. On October 9, 2025, a total of

four (4) bids were received for the Project and the apparent low bidder was The Adjul Corporation (DBA Lee Construction Co.).

While staff was reviewing the submitted bids, the apparent low bidder conducted preliminary construction inspections and observed that the existing 60-inch corrugated metal pipe (CMP) on Encinal Canyon Road had significantly deteriorated beyond what was identified in the original design documents. City staff investigated the 60-inch CMP and confirmed the following worsened conditions of the pipe. An offset joint was found around 15 feet into the pipe, resulting in a reduced vertical clearance of approximately 40 inches from the floor to ceiling. In addition, a severe deformity was observed protruding downward from the top of the pipe, leaving an available clearance of only about 41 inches in another section. These conditions have significantly changed since developing the original project design.

The contract documents specified a spiral-wound polyvinyl chloride (PVC) pipe liner as the rehabilitation method. This product relies on the host pipe maintaining its original circular geometry in order to be properly installed and to perform as intended. Due to the offset joint, deformation, and other damage now documented within the 60-inch CMP, the spiral-wound PVC liner can no longer be utilized as a feasible repair option. A more intensive rehabilitation or replacement strategy will be required to restore the pipe to its original 60-inch diameter and structural capacity.

Restoring the pipe to its full 60-inch diameter is critical and necessary to ensure the facility can adequately convey storm event flows and reduce the risk of upstream flooding and roadway damage. Proceeding under the current contract documents, which were based on less severe damaged pipe conditions and a rehabilitation method that is no longer constructible, would likely result in significant change orders, schedule delays, and potential constructability issues during construction.

Given the increased damage to the pipe, staff recommends that City Council reject all bids and direct staff to revise the scope of work to include a repair method appropriate for the observed condition and to rebid the Project with updated plans and specifications.

DISCUSSION: On March 24, 2025, the City entered into an agreement with Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. to provide engineering design services for the Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) Quick Build Roundabouts Project. The project objective is to improve the safety and operations of the highway through strategically placing and constructing “quick build” modular roundabouts at the intersections of Encinal Canyon Road and El Matador Beach along Pacific Coast Highway, providing continuous traffic flow, speed control, and improved accessibility for pedestrians and cyclists.

The project is currently in the final design and permitting phase. Staff and the consultant are working on Caltrans’ encroachment permit items and the construction bid package.

This amendment includes preparation of the additionally requested necessary project documentation including Design Support Decision Document (DSDD) documentation, Design Engineering and Evaluation Report (DEER), and Storm Water Data Report (SWDR) for the proposed improvements. It also includes additional support services during construction, to perform pre- and post-construction Safety & Operational Performance Assessments, assist in submittal reviews, responses to request for information, and any other items that may arise during the construction phase.

Staff anticipate awarding a construction contract in the first quarter of 2026 with a completion date of late Spring/Summer 2026.

Staff recommends the City Council authorize the Mayor to execute Amendment No. 1, which increases the total not-to-exceed amount to \$477,926. The amended amount includes the additional final design documents, construction support and assessments, submittal reviews, and bid support services.

AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

THIS AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES (“Amendment No. 1”) is made and entered into on January 12, 2026, by and between the CITY OF MALIBU, a municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as “City”, and Kimley- Horn and Associates, a North Carolina corporation, hereinafter referred to as “Consultant”. City and Consultant are each a “Party” and collectively, the “Parties”.

The City and the Consultant agree as follows:

RECITALS

A. On March 24, 2025, the City entered into an Agreement with Consultant for engineering design services for the Pacific Coast Highway Roundabouts near El Matador Beach and Encinal Canyon Road (the “Agreement”).

B. The Parties desires to amend the Agreement to prepare a pre and post-performance assessment of the quick build roundabouts, prepare public outreach educational materials, prepare design support decision document, design engineering and evaluation report, and storm water data report, and Consultant has submitted a proposal for this purpose that is acceptable to the City.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of their mutual promises, obligations and covenants hereinafter contained, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

1. Section 1.0 – Scope of the Consultant’s Services, of the Agreement, is hereby amended to include the additional services and tasks as set forth in the additional Scope of Services attached to this Amendment No. 1 as Exhibit A. In the event that any provision of Exhibit A conflicts with the Agreement, the provisions of the Agreement govern.
2. Section 4.0 – Compensation for Services, of the Agreement, is hereby amended in the amount of \$198,550 for a new total not to exceed \$477,926.
3. The Parties agree that this Amendment No. 1 will be considered signed when the signature of a party is delivered physically or by facsimile transmission or scanned and delivered via electronic mail. Such facsimile or electronic mail copies will be treated in all respects as having the same effect as an original signature.
4. All terms and conditions of the Agreement not amended by this Amendment No. 1 remain in full force and effect.

Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. ("Kimley-Horn") submits this amendment to the City of Malibu ("Client") to conduct pre and post-performance assessment for the Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) Quick Build Roundabouts project. This amendment is based upon the background information, project requirements, and our recent discussions with you and Caltrans. Our understanding of the project, scope of services, fee, and schedule are provided in the following sections.

Project Understanding

We understand that City and Caltrans would like to conduct a pre and post-performance assessment of the quick build roundabouts that are planned to be implemented soon at two (2) locations on PCH along with preparation of public outreach educational materials. Additionally, Caltrans has requested Design Support Decision Document (DSDD) documentation, Design Engineering and Evaluation Report (DEER), and Storm Water Data Report (SWDR) for the proposed improvements.

Scope of Services - Exhibit A for Amendment No. 1

Kimley-Horn will provide the following scope of services as outlined below:

TASK 1: PRE AND POST CONSTRUCTION ASSESSMENT

This scope assumes the following work elements in a Pre-Post Performance Assessment Monitoring Plan:

- Project performance assessment will be performed at the following five milestones:
 - o Pre-construction (1 assessment)
 - o Post-construction (up to 4 assessments between months 1 and 15)

Drone video will be conducted in 4-hour blocks during the am peak period, pm peak period, and one off-peak period such as Saturday midday.

We will incorporate an additional set of comments from Caltrans/City and update the PS&E package.

FISCAL IMPACT: No additional appropriation is required. Funding for this agreement is included in the Adopted Budget for FY 2025-26 in Account No. 100-3008-5100 (Professional Services) and Capital Improvement Projects (Fund 310).

STRATEGIC PLAN IMPLEMENTATION: N/A.

DISCUSSION: On August 12, 2024, City Council authorized a professional services agreement with Transtech for On-Call Traffic Engineering Services. Transtech is a highly reputable firm which provides not only traffic engineering but also civil engineering services for public works projects. Transtech staff have over 30 years of experience in civil engineering projects, including state and federal funded projects, and are experienced in Caltrans design standards, construction guidelines and labor compliance.

Public Works currently has over ten CIP projects in design. Having Transtech available to provide civil engineering services will be an efficient use of resources, minimize delays, assist staff with the workload, and provide cost effective solutions to work on the Strategic Plan or other Public Works Development needs.

The City and the Consultant agree as follows:

RECITALS

A. On August 12, 2024, the City entered into an Agreement with Consultant for on-call traffic engineering services (the “Agreement”).

B. The Parties desires to amend the Agreement to include on-call civil engineering services, and Consultant has submitted a proposal for this purpose that is acceptable to the City.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of their mutual promises, obligations and covenants hereinafter contained, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. Section 1.0 – Scope of the Consultant’s Services, of the Agreement, is hereby amended to include on-call civil engineering services attached to this Amendment No. 1 as Exhibit A. In the event that any provision of Exhibit A conflicts with the Agreement, the provisions of the Agreement govern.

EXHIBIT A SCOPE OF WORK

The Consultant shall provide all professional services described herein below.

1.0 General:

The CONSULTANT will provide consulting Civil Engineering services, including but not limited to: performing plan checking, reviewing and evaluating development proposals, writing conditions of approval, assisting with FEMA projects and procedures, design of disaster related repair projects, grant writing, structural recommendations and calculations, construction management, design of capital improvement projects, including but not limited to; street improvements, storm drain and sanitary sewer improvements, recycled water projects, and parks and recreation projects; performing AutoCAD and other computer aided drafting support; feasibility/concept plan studies and recommendations; preliminary, final and construction design studies; applicable subconsultant and engineering disciplines as required; preparation of construction plans, specifications and estimates (opinions of construction cost); research of utilities and other records; participating in meeting with City staff associated with various development and improvement projects; and such other services as may be required by the CITY. Subject: Acceptance of Emergency Guardrail Repair Project

RECOMMENDED ACTION: 1) Accept Public Works agreement with Stacy and Witbeck, Inc. for emergency guardrail repairs in order to immediately preserve public safety; and 2) Authorize the Public Works Director to submit for recordation a Notice of Completion.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no fiscal impact with accepting the work complete. Funding for this agreement is included in the Adopted Budget for FY 2025-26 in Account Nos. 102-9225-5100 (Burn Area Guardrail Repl – Palisades Fire) and 102-9226-5100 (Malibu Canyon Rd Guardrail – Franklin). Funding for this project includes California Joint Powers of Authority (JPIA), Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and California Governor’s Office of Emergency Services (CalOES).

STRATEGIC PLAN IMPLEMENTATION: N/A.

DISCUSSION: On January 7, 2025, a fire broke out in Pacific Palisades, north of Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) in between Temescal Canyon Road and Palisades Drive. The fire spread west, affecting areas within the jurisdiction of City of Los Angeles, County of Los Angeles, and the City of Malibu. The fire combined with a historic Santa Ana Wind event and power outages created conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property. The Acting Director of Emergency Services (Acting City Manager) proclaimed the existence of a local emergency on January 8, 2025, and the proclamation was ratified by the City Council on January 15, 2025. City Council Meeting 02-24-25 Item 1.B.11. 1 Page 2 of 2 Agenda Item # 1.B.11. The City of Malibu’s Emergency Operations Center was activated on January 7, 2025, and continued to remain active during the event. Once it was safe, the Public Works Director and field staff were able to conduct damage assessments to the City’s infrastructure in the burn area. It was discovered that the existing metal beam guardrails along Tuna Canyon Road, Big Rock Drive, Las Flores

Canyon Road, Rambla Pacifico Street, Carbon Canyon Road, Rambla Vista neighborhood, and Malibu Canyon Road were destroyed and required replacement. The replacement of damaged or destroyed guardrails is imperative to ensure public roads are safe for all modes of travel. The replacement work included upgrading guardrails with Midwest Guardrail Systems per the latest standards, with steel posts for fire resistance.

The work is now complete. Staff recommends the City Council to accept the work performed by Stacy and Witbeck, Inc. and authorize the Public Works Director to submit for recordation a Notice of Completion for the project.

STAFF FOLLOW-UP: Upon acceptance by the City Council of the work associated with this contract, staff will record the Notice of Completion with the Los Angeles County Registrar/Recorder's Office which will allow the City to then release the retention monies following a required 35-day holding period.

Subject: Bailment Agreement with the County of Los Angeles

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Authorize the City Manager to execute a bailment agreement with the County of Los Angeles to allow the Sheriff's Department to use a new City vehicle for the Volunteers on Patrol program.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no fiscal impact associated with the recommended action.

STRATEGIC PLAN IMPLEMENTATION: This item supports the City's 2025 Strategic Plan Goal 4: Improve Public Safety.

DISCUSSION: During Fiscal Year 2024-2025, the City purchased a new vehicle for the Volunteers on Patrol (VOP) to support ongoing public safety efforts. The VOP program consists of civilian volunteers who assist the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department (LASD) in the City of Malibu by identifying suspicious activities, crimes in progress or other dangerous circumstances, helping with traffic control after vehicle collisions, and enforcing the City's parking regulations. LASD operates the VOP program for the City.

The County of Los Angeles requires the City to enter into a bailment agreement (attached) so that LASD can use the new vehicle. Under the bailment agreement, LASD takes physical possession of the VOP vehicle, equips the vehicle with all required law enforcement equipment, maintains automobile insurance, and pays for normal maintenance, repairs, fuel, washing, and required service. The new VOP vehicle will be used only for the City's VOP program and will be parked at Malibu City Hall at the end of each shift. The legal title of the new VOP vehicle(s) will remain in the name of the City of Malibu. The City previously entered into bailment agreements with the County of Los Angeles in 2020, 2022, and July 2025 for four other VOP vehicles.

Staff recommends that the City Council authorize the City Manager to execute the bailment agreement with the County of Los Angeles to allow the Sheriff's Department to use the new City vehicle for the VOP program.

**BAILMENT AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN
THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES AND THE CITY OF MALIBU**

This Bailment Agreement (“Agreement”) is made and entered into this 12th day of January 2026, by and between the County of Los Angeles (“County”) and the City of Malibu (“City”). The City and County may be individually referred to as “Party” or collectively referred to as the “Parties.”

RECITALS

(A) The Los Angeles County Sheriff’s Department (“Sheriff’s Department”) established a Volunteers on Patrol (“VOP”) program, which consists of civilian volunteers who act as the “eyes and ears” of the Sheriff’s Department. On December 13, 2010, the City approved the establishment of the VOP program to allow its residents to assist the Sheriff’s Department in achieving its goals.

(B) The VOP volunteers (“Volunteers”) provide assistance to the Sheriff’s Department by identifying suspicious activities, crimes in progress, or other dangerous circumstances, and notifying the authorities for proper handling. They also help enforce the City’s parking regulations through the issuance of parking citations.

(C) As such, the Parties wish to enter into this Agreement so that the Sheriff’s Department may continue its VOP program within the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the foregoing recitals and the mutual covenants and agreements herein, the Parties agree as follows:

1. Bailment of Property

The City hereby bails a **2025 Ford Explorer** (“Vehicle”), Vehicle Identification Number **1FM5K8AB9SGC33685**, to the County for the exclusive use of the Sheriff’s Department, as set forth in this Agreement. The Parties shall execute an amendment to this Agreement for any additional vehicle the City bails to the County that is not identified herein.

2. Term of Bailment

The term of this Agreement shall be ten years and commence on January 12, 2026. If not extended by the Parties, the Agreement will terminate on the 12th day of January, 2036. At the end of the initial ten-year term, the Parties will have the opportunity to extend the term of the Agreement for an additional five years by mutual written notice, expiring on January 12, 2040. The Parties may not elect to extend the Agreement for a period other than the specified five-year terms without executing an amendment to this Agreement.

3. Safekeeping and Maintenance:

The County shall exercise due care for the safekeeping of the Vehicle. The County has the right to inspect said Vehicle prior to acceptance. The County shall inspect the Vehicle upon delivery and, by acceptance thereof, finds the Vehicle in good working order and condition. The County shall maintain the Vehicle in good working order and condition, ensure proper servicing, and shall comply in every respect with any manufacturer's/owner's manual (including its recommended maintenance schedule) that comes with the Vehicle. The County shall pay for normal maintenance, repair, and service required for the proper operation of the Vehicle. The County shall pay for all costs related to the vehicle, including fuel, washing, parking, and garage storage. The County will provide, install, and maintain all required equipment, including voice radio, amber lights, and graphics on the Vehicle. All required law enforcement equipment installed by the Sheriff's Department will be removed from the Vehicle, at no cost to the City, prior to return of the Vehicle to the City.

4. Indemnification

The County agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the City, its officers, officials, and employees from any and all liability, losses, expenses, costs (including without limitation reasonable attorney's fees, expert fees and all other costs and fees of litigation), or damages the City may suffer and from any claims, demands, or judgments against the City arising out of County's (including, but not limited to, the Sheriff's Department and the Volunteers) use or operation of the City's Vehicle. It is expressly understood and agreed that the foregoing provisions are intended to be as broad and inclusive as is permitted by the law of the State of California and will survive termination of this Agreement. This indemnification does not extend to any liability resulting from inherent defects or malfunctions in such Vehicles related to the manufacturer's acts or omissions.

5. Titles

Legal title to the Vehicle is, and shall at all times, remain in the name of the City. The County shall hold title as the registered owner only. The Vehicle shall not be transferred or delivered by the County to any persons other than the City without the City's prior written consent.

6. Cost

Except as otherwise set forth in this Agreement, the County's use of the Vehicle shall be at no cost to the City.

7. Inspection by County

The County agrees to allow the City to inspect the Vehicle or otherwise observe it at such times and locations as mutually agreed upon. The County shall provide the City with such mileage, safety, operating, and other information, or copies of any such records maintained by the County with respect to the Vehicle, as the City or any government agency may require from time to time.

8. Use of Vehicle

a) The County may use the Vehicle for the sole and exclusive purpose of the VOP program. Unless written approval is obtained from the City, the County shall not use the Vehicle outside of the City's jurisdictional limits, except when necessary for maintenance, repair, refueling, inspection, or washing. The Vehicle may only be operated by Volunteers, employees of the City of Malibu, or other individuals approved in writing by the City.

b) The Vehicle shall be parked at Malibu City Hall at the end of each shift.

c) The County shall not use or operate the Vehicle in violation of any federal, state, local or provincial law, rule, regulation, or ordinance including those pertaining to the age and licensing of drivers. Under no circumstances shall the County disconnect the Vehicles' odometers or other mileage recording devices. Nor shall the Vehicle be used or operated as follows:

i. In a manner subjecting it to depreciation above the normal depreciation associated with law enforcement use.

ii. For an illegal purpose or by a person under the influence of alcohol or narcotics.

9. Risk of Loss

a) The County shall assume all risks of loss to the Vehicle from the time the Vehicle is delivered by the City to the County, and upon inspection and acceptance by County, until the Vehicle is returned to the City at its place of business.

b) Upon inspection and acceptance of the Vehicle, the County shall be responsible for any and all damages to the Vehicle except those resulting from inherent defects or malfunctions in such Vehicles related to manufacturers' acts or omissions.

c) In the event of damages to the Vehicle, the County shall notify the City and follow such instructions that the City may provide with respect to repair or disposal of the Vehicle. If the Vehicle is lost, stolen, destroyed, or declared to be a total constructive loss (subject to the City agreement as to such condition), the County shall notify the City thereof and hold any wreckage for disposal by the City. With respect to any loss, theft, or destruction of the Vehicle, the County and the City shall negotiate the value for a comparably equipped vehicle in a

condition similar to the lost, stolen, or destroyed Vehicle immediately prior to any such loss to be reimbursed to the City.

10. Termination

Either Party may terminate this Agreement by giving five (5) calendar days advance written notice to the other Party. Upon termination of this Agreement, the County shall immediately return the Vehicle to the City.

11. Amendments

No variation, modification, change, or amendment to this Agreement shall be binding upon any Party unless such variation, modification, change, or amendment is in writing and duly authorized and executed by all Parties. This Agreement shall not be amended or modified by oral agreements or understandings among the parties or by any acts or conduct of the Parties.

12. Notices

All notices or demands required or permitted to be given or made under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be hand delivered with signed receipt or mailed by first-class registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the parties as identified below. Addresses and persons to be notified may be changed by either party by giving ten (10) calendar days prior written notice thereof to the other party.

13. Insurance

The County shall maintain comprehensive general and automobile liability insurance for the Vehicle protecting the County in amounts not less than \$2,000,000 for personal injury to any one person, \$2,000,000 for injuries arising out of one occurrence, and \$500,000 for property damages or a combined single limit of \$2,000,000. The County shall name and list as additional insured the City, its officers and employees. This insurance policy shall specify its acts as primary insurance for the Vehicle and covers the operations of the County pursuant to the terms of this Agreement.

14. Independent Contractor

This Agreement is by and between the County and the City and is not intended, and shall not be construed, to create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture, or association, as between the County and the City. The employees and agents of one party shall not be construed to be employees and agents of the other Party.

15. Volunteers

The County expressly acknowledges that the Volunteers are members of the Sheriff's Department Civilian Volunteers and are not agents, employees, officers, or otherwise associated with, the City. The County is responsible for ensuring that the Volunteers comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, the Sheriff's Department's Civilian Volunteer Regulations and Guidelines, and other rules, regulations, or guidelines that may be applicable.

16. Governing Law, Jurisdiction, and Venue

This Agreement shall be governed by, and construed in accordance with, the laws of the State of California. The City agrees and consents to the exclusive jurisdiction of the courts of the State of California for all purposes regarding this Agreement and further agrees and consents that venue of any action brought hereunder shall be exclusively in the County of Los Angeles.

17. Validity and Waiver

If any provision of this Agreement or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of this Agreement and the application of such provision to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby. No waiver by the County of any breach of any provision of this Agreement shall constitute a waiver of any other breach or of such provision. Failure of the County to enforce at any time, or from time to time, any provision of this Agreement shall not be construed as a waiver thereof. The rights and remedies set forth in this section shall not be exclusive and are in addition to any other rights and remedies provided by law or under this Agreement.

18. Assignment

A Party shall not assign its rights or delegate its duties under this Agreement, in whole or in part, without the prior written consent of the other party, and any attempted assignment or delegation without such consent shall be null and void.

19. Authorization Warranty

The Parties represent and warrant that the person executing this Agreement on behalf of each Party is an authorized agent who has actual authority to bind the Parties to each and every term, condition, and obligation of this Agreement and that all requirements of the Parties have been fulfilled to provide such actual authority.

20. Integrated Agreement

This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding of the Parties, and no representations or promises have been made that are not fully set forth herein. The Parties understand and agree that no modifications of this Agreement will be binding unless such modification is in writing, duly accepted, and executed by both parties pursuant to Section 11 of this Agreement.

21. Counterparts

This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which, when so executed, shall be deemed to be an original, but such counterparts together shall constitute one and the same instrument.

22. Headings

The section headings that appear throughout this Agreement have been provided solely for the convenience of the Parties and do not define or limit the scope of any provision. Consequently, the headings shall not be considered when interpreting this Agreement.

Subject: Termination of the Declaration of a Local Emergency

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Adopt Resolution No. 26-01 terminating the declaration of local emergency as a result of the risk of fires associated with individuals engaged in unpermitted camping.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no fiscal impact associated with the recommended action.

STRATEGIC PLAN IMPLEMENTATION: This item supports the City's 2025 Strategic Plan Goal 4. Improve Public Safety, Objective 4.3: Reduce Homeless Encampments.

DISCUSSION: The California Government Code Section 8630 empowers the City Council to proclaim the existence of a local emergency when there is extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the territorial limits of the City. At the June 24, 2024, Regular City Council Meeting, the Council adopted Resolution No. 24-30 which established criteria for declaring the existence of a local emergency and initiating a program for reducing the risk of fires associated with individuals engaged in unpermitted camping in Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones (VHFHSZ). The criteria for declaring the existence of a local emergency was set at a Live Fuel Moisture (LFM) of 65% or less as determined by the Los Angeles County Fire Department Forestry Division for Santa Monica Mountains Chamise.

On September 10, 2025, the Los Angeles County Fire Department Forestry Division posted an LFM of 63% for Santa Monica Mountains Chamise. On September 29, 2025, the Council adopted Resolution No. 25-49, declaring the existence of a local emergency and initiating a program for reducing the risk of fires associated with individuals engaged in unpermitted camping.

Resolution No. 24-30 also sets minimum criteria for terminating the local emergency, which includes:

- When the City has received a minimum of 2" of recorded rainfall as determined by Los Angeles County Department of Public Works Season Total (October 1- May 1) for the Big Rock Mesa site; and
- The Live Fuel Moisture is 80% or greater as determined by the Los Angeles County Fire Department Forestry Division for Santa Monica Mountains Chamise; and
- There has been no Fire Weather Watch or Red Flag Warning in the previous two weeks; and
- When there is no Fire Weather Watch or Red Flag Warning in the extended forecast as determined by the National Weather Service (NWS) California Fire Weather Forecast for either the Malibu Coast or Santa Monica Mountains NRA.

As of the date of this report, all the conditions for termination have been met. On November 26, 2025, the Los Angeles County Fire Department Forestry Division posted an LFM of 98% for Santa Monica Mountains Chamise. As of November 21, 2025, Malibu has received 7.72" of rain, per the Los Angeles County Department of Public Works. There has been no Fire Weather Watch or Red Flag Warning in the previous two weeks and there is no Fire Weather Watch or Red Flag Warning in the extended forecast.

Additionally, the Government Code Section 8630 requires that the governing body proclaims the termination of the local emergency at the earliest possible date that conditions warrant. Since the fire risk conditions that prompted the emergency declaration have improved and the termination criteria described in Resolution No. 24-30 have been met, staff recommend adopting Resolution No. 26-01 terminating the state of local emergency.

RESOLUTION NO. 26-01

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MALIBU TERMINATING THE EXISTENCE OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY AND INITIATING A PROGRAM FOR REDUCING THE RISK OF FIRES ASSOCIATED WITH INDIVIDUALS ENGAGED IN UNPERMITTED CAMPING

The City Council of the City of Malibu does hereby find, order and resolve as follows:

SECTION 1. Recitals.

A. Resolution No. 24-30 established criteria for declaring the existence of a local emergency and initiating a program for reducing the risk of fires associated with individuals engaged in unpermitted camping in Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones (VHFHSZ) and established criteria for terminating the state of emergency. The criteria for declaring the existence of a local emergency was set at a Live Fuel Moisture (LFM) of 65% or less as determined by the Los Angeles County Fire Department Forestry Division for Santa Monica Mountains Chamise.

B. On September 10, 2025, the Los Angeles County Fire Department Forestry Division posted an LFM of 63% for Santa Monica Mountains Chamise

C. On September 29, 2025, the Council adopted Resolution No. 25-49, declaring the existence of a local emergency and initiating a program for reducing the risk of fires associated with individuals engaged in unpermitted camping.

D. The minimum criteria for termination the local emergency includes: 1)When the City has received a minimum of 2" of recorded rainfall as determined by Los Angeles County Department of Public Works Season Total (October 1- May 1) for the Big Rock Mesa site; and 2) The Live Fuel Moisture is 80% or greater as determined by the Los Angeles County Fire Department Forestry Division for Santa Monica Mountains Chamise; and 3)There has been no Fire Weather Watch or Red Flag Warning in the previous two weeks; and 4) When there is no Fire Weather Watch or Red Flag Warning in the extended forecast as determined by the National Weather Service (NWS) California Fire Weather Forecast for either the Malibu Coast or Santa Monica Mountains NRA.

E. As of December 8, 2025, all four criteria for termination have been met.

SECTION 2. The City Council does hereby terminate the state of a local emergency.

SECTION 3. This resolution and the actions taken and/or proposed herein are not a project pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) since they are activities that are excluded from the definition of a project by section 21065 of the California Public Resources Code and section 15378(b) of the State CEQA Guidelines. The proposed actions are organizational or administrative activities of government which will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment. In the alternative, find that the actions are exempt from CEQA as specific actions necessary to prevent or mitigate an emergency pursuant to section 21080(b)(4) and section 15269(c) of the State CEQA Guidelines.

SECTION 4. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this resolution and enter

it into the book of original resolutions.

Subject: Facility Fee Waiver Policy

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Adopt City Council Policy #53 Facility Fee Waiver.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no fiscal impact associated with the recommended action.

STRATEGIC PLAN IMPLEMENTATION: N/A

DISCUSSION: At the November 10, 2025 Regular meeting, Council reviewed and provided feedback on the draft City Council Policy #53 Facility Fee Waiver. Staff have incorporated the recommended revisions, and the policy is now presented for final approval (Attachment 1).

City Council Policy #53 will provide additional guidelines and criteria, streamline the approval process, and allow the City Manager to grant previously approved fee waiver applications. This change will eliminate the need for annual, repetitive Council fee waiver reviews at Regular meetings. The new policy outlines eligibility criteria, procedures, marketing guidelines, and the application process.

Background

The City receives numerous fee waiver requests from nonprofit organizations that utilize City-owned facilities throughout the year. The City has Fee Waiver Guidelines for Facility Use Permits and Event Permits, established in 2018. The Guidelines provided staff with a pathway to review and allowed the City Manager to approve requests; however, over the years, fee waiver requests exceeded the amounts that Management felt comfortable approving. Thus, the Council's involvement in reviewing and approving fee waivers has become a common practice.

Policy #53

Title Facility Fee Waiver Policy

Purpose The Facility Fee Waiver Policy establishes fiscally responsible guidelines to equitably evaluate and consider fee waiver requests for one-time events or temporary uses of City facilities and parks. These guidelines establish parameters for waiving outdoor park or indoor facility use fees for community events, activities, and programs that have a public benefit. For purposes of this policy, the term “fee waiver” is to grant a reduction or dismissal of a required fee normally charged for the use of a City-owned facility or park.

Policy Statement

The City of Malibu (“City”) recognizes the value of working with and supporting organizations to provide services and programs that benefit the Malibu community. The Community Services Department strives to be an exceptional steward over City facilities, parks, and funding for programs and services. Charging fees is a standard practice when individuals, private groups, government, or non-profit groups wish to reserve and exclusively utilize public facilities. Fees charged for programs and facility/park usage help cover the cost of providing such services and maintaining facilities. This policy is established to determine when applicable City rental fees (e.g., application, facility use, staffing, permit, and other departmental charges) established in the City of Malibu Master Fee Schedule may be waived.

Scheduling and use of facilities are subject to availability. City programs and events, or previous commitments, have priority use. The policy is effective to the extent a fee waiver can be considered without negatively impacting the City’s or Community Services Department’s budget or current operations.

Eligibility Facility fees may be waived when there is a public benefit.

Eligible fees that can be waived include:

- Application fees, specific permit fees, staffing fees related to facility supervision, facility use/rental fees
- Requests for fee waivers can include sports, arts, cultural, and general events or programs

Eligible organizations include:

- 1) Intergovernmental Cooperation
- 2) Non-Profit Organization
- 3) City of Malibu Co-Sponsored Program

Intergovernmental Cooperation

Fees may be waived for events or temporary uses when the applicant is a government agency, and the use is related to the performance of its normal functions and is a benefit to Malibu residents.

Non-Profit Organization

A fee waiver may be approved for eligible non-profit organizations, including organizations with a non-profit fiscal agent, which is tax-exempt under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The imposition of the fees would create financial hardship for the organization or would have a detrimental effect on the services provided to the public. The program or event is of significant value to the community or to a significant portion of its residents. The event or program is open to the public and is in compliance with the City's non-discrimination policy.

City of Malibu Sponsored Program

Fees may be waived for events and programs that are sponsored or co-sponsored by the City. The organization/agency requesting sponsorship by the City has a 501(c)(3) status, the program must benefit the Malibu community, and no event fees shall be charged. All resources provided by the City in sponsorship of the event (fee waiver or in-kind service) must be allocated within the current budget without a reduction or increase in services or costs.

Ineligibility

Ineligible Use/Waiver Requests:

- Organizations based outside the City of Malibu, unless the organization has demonstrated that its benefits are primarily for Malibu residents
- Fundraising or charitable events unless the funds have a public benefit
- Programs or events that are not open to the public
- Political or election campaign events or programs
- Religious organizations seeking space or facilities for religious services
- Commercial events
- Corporate events
- Family or social gatherings
- Programs or events that provide little or no community benefit
- Trainings that charge for participation
- Programs or events on Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District property (example: Malibu Community Pool)
- Programs or events that would conflict with City program or event scheduling (example: Chumash Day or Breakfast with Santa)
- Organizations that failed to fulfill their obligations that previously received a fee waiver

Fees that cannot be waived under this Policy:

- Costs for contract personnel, including but not limited to security, maintenance, custodial, and audio-visual technicians
- Costs of rented equipment, including but not limited to barricades, k-rails, portable restrooms, sound systems, etc.
- Deposits for facility use
- Insurance fees

- County, State, or Federal licenses, permit fees, and personnel fees, from Alcoholic Beverage Control, Department of Public Health, Fire Department, Sheriff Department, etc.

Application Process

1. Organization must
 - a. Review and meet the Policy criteria
 - b. Complete and submit the fee waiver application and required documents
 - c. Complete and submit the facility use application at MalibuCity.org/Register
 - i. Insurance documents, including an Endorsement of Insurance naming the City of Malibu as additionally insured, which will be required during the facility rental process
 - d. If the program or event involves multiple City Department approvals (example: Planning Department Temporary Use Permit), the request will be forwarded to that Department; however, it is the responsibility of the Organization to ensure that all the required documents are submitted and approved in the various Departments
2. Application Required Documents
 - a. Description of the program or event, including purpose
 - b. How the program or event will provide a community benefit
 - c. Program or event budget listing revenue and expenditures
 - d. How the imposition of fees would create financial hardship or would have a detrimental effect on the organization
 - e. List of partners that will be a part of or sponsor the program or event
 - f. Marketing and outreach plan
 - g. Number of working staff or volunteers and schedule/working shifts
 - h. Community impact(s)
 - i. Experience coordinating programs and events
 - j. Experience working in Malibu
 - k. Non-Profit letter/tax-exempt status from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS)
 - l. Organization's structure, board, and/or bylaws
 - m. An annual financial statement with revenue and expenditures
 - n. Other documents or information required or requested by the Community Services Department

Criteria

In determining if a facility fee waiver is warranted, the following criteria may be considered:

Organization Structure and Experience

- Organization has experience coordinating programs or events
- Organization serves the Malibu community
- Organization has experience working with the Malibu community

Application Completeness, Compliance, and Requirements

- Complete all required applications
- Submit the required application documents 60 days prior to the program or event
- The program or event must comply with the City's non-discrimination policy
- Organization is in good financial standing with the City

- Organization must have no previous violations related to the Fee Waiver Policy and/or Code Enforcement violations (organizations that present false information about their event or program may not be eligible for a fee waiver)
- Organization may collaborate with other entities; however, all partnerships and sponsors must be included in the program or event description
- Organization's program or event must align with the City's vision and mission statement
- Organization's proposed program or event is not available through the Community Services Department or other City Departments
- Program or event is open to the public
- Program or event does not have an admission fee, or the organization may propose free admission to Malibu residents
- Leagues with program fees must demonstrate how expenses will benefit athletes and the City (example: field improvements, sod installation, player uniforms, umpire fees, etc.)
- The proposed event or program will have no significant impact on City facilities or department activities, and the organization will provide staffing or volunteers and materials to mitigate any impacts created by the event or program, or ensure that the impacts are adequately offset by the public benefit provided by the program or event
- Organizations that fail to abide by the guidelines and requirements outlined in the Policy may be denied a facility fee waiver for up to twelve (12) months

Acknowledgement and Marketing

Organizations granted a facility fee waiver shall acknowledge the City in all publicity relating to the event or program. Acknowledgement includes the City of Malibu logo and statements in all advertising and promotional material, press releases, and other promotional contexts.

City Manager Approval

The City Manager has the authority to approve facility fee waivers to Organizations that previously received a Council-approved fee waiver based on the following criteria,

- Fees do not exceed \$75,000
- The event, program, or league occurs annually
- The Organization meets the Policy criteria
- The Organization has received Council-approved fee waiver in the past 5 years

City Council Approval

The City Council will review and determine fee waiver approvals for Organizations that have never applied for a facility fee waiver and for Organizations that exceed the \$75,000 facility fee waiver threshold.

- Organizations must submit all required documents
- All facility fee waiver requests will be approved or denied at the sole discretion of the City

Approval and Revision

This policy will be reviewed periodically and revised as needed to reflect changes in community values, financial conditions, or legal requirements. Revisions must be approved by the City Council.

Subject: Resolution Extending the Declaration of the Existence of a Local Emergency Regarding the Franklin Fire

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Adopt Resolution No. 26-03, extending the declaration of the existence of a local emergency in response to the Franklin Fire.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no fiscal impact associated with the recommended action. The existence of the local emergency will potentially help qualify the City and its residents for reimbursement for certain disaster response expenditures.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY: This item supports the Public Safety and day-to-day operations identified in the Adopted FY 2024-25 Strategic Priority Project List. Responding to disasters is the City's most immediate and top priority as part of the city's fundamental operations.

DISCUSSION: On December 9, 2024, the Franklin Fire started in the Santa Monica Mountains on Malibu Canyon Road, south of Piuma Road. The fire combined with high winds and power outages to create conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property. The Acting Director of Emergency Services (Assistant City Manager) proclaimed the existence of a local emergency on December 10, 2024.

On December 16, 2024, the City Council held a Special Meeting and adopted Resolution No. 24-64, confirming the existence of a local emergency and ratifying the Proclamation of Existence of a Local Emergency.

Areas affected by disasters frequently become targets of criminal activity, including the burglary of uninhabited homes and businesses due to damage and the theft of building

materials during the reconstruction process. Malibu is a particular target for these activities since the Franklin Fire and the Palisades Fire.

The fire caused extensive damage to the electrical, irrigation, and wastewater systems along Civic Center Way, all of which will need to be replaced. Trees that were severely burned along Civic Center Way have been designated as dead and must be removed, as they are now considered a hazard.

The fire caused disruptions to Malibu's commercial activity, including brief access restrictions and reduced customer traffic. The City finds that supporting those affected remains important to maintaining local economic stability. Providing general recovery assistance and flexible, temporary measures will help ensure that any businesses experiencing fire-related setbacks can resume normal operations.

Government Code Section 8630 requires that the City Council review the need for continuing a local emergency at least once every 60 days until the City Council terminates the local emergency.

As such, City staff recommend adopting Resolution No. 26-03 extending the declaration of the existence of a local emergency. If adopted, the City Council will review, and as needed renew, this action at least every 60 days.

SECTION 1. Recitals.

A. On December 9, 2024, the Franklin Fire started in the Santa Monica Mountains on Malibu Canyon Road, south of Piuma Road. The fire combined with high winds and power outages created conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property.

B. The Acting Director of Emergency Services of the City proclaimed the existence of a local emergency on December 10, 2024.

C. On December 16, 2024, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 24-64, confirming the existence of a local emergency and ratifying the Proclamation of Existence of a Local Emergency.

D. On January 27, 2025, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 25-05, extending the declaration of the existence of a local emergency in response to the Franklin Fire.

E. On March 24, 2025, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 25-14, extending the declaration of the existence of a local emergency in response to the Franklin Fire.

F. On May 21, 2025, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 25-18, extending the declaration of the existence of a local emergency in response to the Franklin Fire.

G. On June 23, 2025, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 25-36, extending the declaration of the existence of a local emergency in response to the Franklin Fire.

Subject: Resolution Extending the Declaration of the Existence of a Local Emergency Regarding the Palisades Fire

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Adopt Resolution No. 26-04, extending the declaration of the existence of a local emergency in response to the Palisades Fire.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no fiscal impact associated with the recommended action. The existence of the local emergency will potentially help qualify the City and its residents for reimbursement for certain disaster response expenditures.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY: This item supports the Public Safety and day-to-day operations identified in the Adopted FY 2024-25 Strategic Priority Project List. Responding to disasters is the City's most immediate and top priority as part of the city's fundamental operations.

DISCUSSION: On January 7, 2025, the Palisades Fire started in or around Pacific Palisades and was driven into City limits by a historic Santa Ana Wind event causing hurricane-strength winds in neighboring areas and the City. The strong Santa Ana Winds have created difficulties mitigating the fire and impaired the ability of airborne fire-fighting. The fire combined with high winds and power outages created conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property

On January 14, 2025, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 25-01, confirming the existence of a local emergency and ratifying the Proclamation of Existence of a Local Emergency.

On May 23, 2025, Pacific Coast Highway was opened to the public, and the California National Guard demobilized, leaving fire-impacted neighborhoods vulnerable as an influx

of visitors began entering the city. Areas affected by disasters frequently become targets of criminal activity, including the burglary of uninhabited homes and businesses due to damage and the theft of building materials during the reconstruction process.

The fire caused extensive damage to drainage systems in the Big Rock Mesa Landslide Maintenance District, which are still being repaired.

The fire caused major disruptions to Malibu's commercial areas, with many businesses experiencing temporary closures, reduced access, severe revenue losses, and some being completely devastated. Because local businesses provide essential services, jobs, and economic stability, the City finds that supporting their recovery is critical. Providing targeted assistance, such as small business grant funding, coordination with state and federal resources, and other temporary relief measures is needed to help affected businesses reopen, rebuild, and recover Malibu's local economy.

Government Code Section 8630 requires that the City Council review the need for continuing a local emergency at least once every 60 days until the City Council terminates the local emergency.

As such, City staff recommends adopting Resolution No. 26-04 extending the declaration of the existence of a local emergency. If adopted, the City Council will review, and as needed renew, this action at least every 60 days.

The City Council of the City of Malibu does hereby find, order and resolve as follows:

SECTION 1. Recitals.

A. On January 7, 2025, the Palisades Fire started in or around Pacific Palisades and was driven into City limits by a historic Santa Ana Wind event causing hurricane-strength winds in neighboring areas and the City. The strong Santa Ana Winds created difficulties mitigating the fire and impaired the ability of airborne fire-fighting. The fire combined with high winds and power outages created conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property.

B. The Acting Director of Emergency Services of the City proclaimed the existence of a local emergency on January 8, 2025.

C. On January 14, 2025, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 25-01, confirming the existence of a local emergency and ratifying the Proclamation of Existence of a Local Emergency.

D. On March 10, 2025, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 25-09, extending the declaration of the existence of a local emergency in response to the Palisades Fire.

E. On April 28, 2025, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 25-16, extending the declaration of the existence of a local emergency in response to the Palisades Fire.

F. On June 23, 2025, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 25-34, extending the declaration of the existence of a local emergency in response to the Palisades Fire.

G. On August 11, 2025, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 25-43, extending the declaration of the existence of a local emergency in response to the Palisades Fire.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: 1) Conduct the Public Hearing; and 2) Conduct the second reading, unless waived, and adopt Ordinance No. 531, adopting by reference Title 26 of the Los Angeles County Code, incorporating the California Building Code, 2025 Edition; Title 27 of the Los Angeles County Code, incorporating the California Electrical Code, 2025 Edition; Title 28 of the Los Angeles County Code, incorporating the California Plumbing Code, 2025 Edition; Title 29 of the Los Angeles County Code, incorporating the California Mechanical Code, 2025 Edition; Title 30 of the Los Angeles County Code, incorporating the California Residential Code, 2025 Edition; Title 31 of the Los Angeles County Code, incorporating the California Green Building Standards Code, 2025 edition; the California Energy Code, 2025 Edition; Title 33 of the Los Angeles County Code, incorporating the California Existing Building Code, 2025 Edition; the California Fire Code, 2025 Edition; making amendments to said codes; repealing Ordinance No. 503, and finding the action exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no fiscal impact associated with the recommended action.

STRATEGIC PLAN IMPLEMENTATION: This item supports the City's 2025 Strategic Plan related to Goal 1: Support Community Rebuilding and Long-Term Recovery.

DISCUSSION: On December 8, 2025, the City Council adopted urgency Ordinance No. 531U, introduced on first reading Ordinance No. 531, and directed staff to schedule the second reading and public hearing for January 12, 2026.

The State adopts the California Building Standards Code (CBSC), Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations, every three (3) years. In addition to the California Building Code, the CBSC consists of multiple code volumes pertaining to a building's

structural, plumbing, electrical, and mechanical systems. These codes are organized into the 12 parts of Title 24, many of which are based on the model codes set forth below:

Taken together, the building standards making up the CBSC apply to all building occupancies throughout the state, whether or not adopted by a local jurisdiction. However, local governments will typically pass ordinances adopting those parts of the CBSC by reference, which they seek to amend in accordance with local conditions and to establish administrative provisions (e.g., fees, remedies for code violations, etc.).

Local amendments must be specific to each edition of the CBSC. State law also requires that amendments to building standards be based on a governing body’s express finding that such modification is reasonably necessary because of local climatic, geological, or topographical conditions (Administrative provisions which do not establish building

standards may be enacted without necessity findings). As the new state codes become effective on January 1, 2026, at that time local building standards based on modifications to the 2022 codes will no longer be applicable to new construction in Malibu. Therefore, staff recommends that the Council adopt the local amendments set forth in the proposed ordinance with the accompanying findings.

Adopting the County Codes

To provide the public with locally applicable and efficient regional building standards, Malibu, along with neighboring cities, adopts the state codes as adopted and amended by Los Angeles County:

- 2025 California Building Code as amended by the 2026 Los Angeles County Building Code
- 2025 California Residential Code as amended by the 2026 Los Angeles County Residential Code
- 2025 California Green Building Standards Code as amended by the 2026 Los Angeles County Green Building Standards Code
- 2025 California Plumbing Code as amended by the 2026 Los Angeles County Plumbing Code
- 2025 California Mechanical Code as amended by the 2026 Los Angeles County Mechanical Code
- 2025 California Electrical Code as amended by the 2026 Los Angeles County Electrical Code
- 2025 California Existing Building Code as amended by the 2026 Los Angeles County Existing Building Code

The County codes adopt by reference the corresponding 2025 edition of the state code as amended by the Los Angeles Basin Chapter of the International Code Council. The Los Angeles Basin Chapter took the lead in reviewing the 2025 California Building, Residential, and Green Building Standards Codes as well as the amendments developed by the Los Angeles Regional Uniform Code Program to determine the building standards necessary for the Los Angeles basin. This effort ensures conformity and consistency across local jurisdictions and will provide designers, developers, and the public at large with a unified set of local amendments. Most of Malibu's modifications to the County code are addressed to City administrative procedures.

Absent from the above list is the 2026 Los Angeles County Fire Code, which the County expects to adopt at a later time. For this reason, the City is adopting the state fire code. When Los Angeles County adopts its new fire code, the City will review the amendments and return with a recommendation to either adopt the County Fire Code by reference or remain with the state.

In addition to the County amendments, the Community Development Department recommends additional modifications to the state building code and plumbing code standards as reasonably necessary for Malibu's local conditions. All required findings for the County amendments to the CBSC and the City's additional amendments are set forth in Attachment 3. Finally, while the County is not adopting the California Energy Code, staff recommends its adoption to establish local remedies for any violations of those building standards.

Because the 2025 wildfires triggered state and local emergency declarations, some laws and regulations have been suspended or streamlined to accelerate rebuilding for properties "substantially damaged or destroyed" in the fires. However, that order does not waive building standards or fire-safety code compliance. Rebuilding still must meet applicable building and fire codes, including the 2025 Title 24 building and wildfire-resilience and WUI standards for Malibu properties in the high-fire-hazard zone. Even like-for-like rebuilds (+10%), should expect upgrades related to fire-resistant materials, modern structural/seismic standards, and fire-safety/egress/ventilation. These standards are designed to make homes safer and more resilient.

ALTERNATIVES: No alternatives are recommended. The 2025 Edition of the California Building Standards Code, the applicable building standards for all occupancies throughout the state, is operative as of January 1, 2026. Unless the City Council adopts this ordinance and accompanying findings, local modifications to the standards necessary to account for the City's climatic, geological, and topographical conditions no longer apply to applications for a building permit in Malibu. The immediate preservation of the public peace, health, and safety requires continuity of building standards tailored to local conditions. If not adopted, the City will risk having structures built that are not subject to construction standards designed for the region's vulnerability to fire and seismic activity.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MALIBU ADOPTING BY REFERENCE TITLE 26 OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY CODE, INCORPORATING THE CALIFORNIA BUILDING CODE, 2025 EDITION; TITLE 27 OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY CODE, INCORPORATING THE CALIFORNIA ELECTRICAL CODE, 2025 EDITION; TITLE 28 OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY CODE, INCORPORATING THE CALIFORNIA PLUMBING CODE, 2025 EDITION; TITLE 29 OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY CODE, INCORPORATING THE CALIFORNIA MECHANICAL CODE, 2025 EDITION; TITLE 30 OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY CODE, INCORPORATING THE CALIFORNIA RESIDENTIAL CODE, 2025 EDITION; TITLE 31 OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY CODE, INCORPORATING THE CALIFORNIA GREEN BUILDING STANDARDS CODE, 2025 EDITION; THE CALIFORNIA ENERGY CODE, 2025 EDITION; TITLE 33 OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY CODE, INCORPORATING THE CALIFORNIA EXISTING BUILDING CODE, 2025 EDITION; THE CALIFORNIA FIRE CODE, 2025 EDITION; MAKING AMENDMENTS TO SAID CODES; AND FINDING THE ACTION EXEMPT FROM THE CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT

The City Council of the City of Malibu does hereby ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Findings.

Pursuant to California Health and Safety Code Sections 17958.5, 17958.7 and 18941.5, the City Council hereby makes each finding of reasonable necessity for modifications as stated separately in Attachment No. 2 to the December 8, 2025 City Council Agenda Report for Item No. X.X. for each such modification as identified in Los Angeles County Titles 24, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32 and 33. These modifications to the California Building Standards Code, incorporating the model codes, are reasonably necessary due to the local climate, characterized by hot, dry summers and the high potential for seismic activity which make structures particularly vulnerable to rapidly spreading fires and structural damage.

SECTION 2. Section 15.04.010 of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

15.04.010 Adoption of Building Code.

Except as hereinafter provided, Title 26, Building Code, of the Los Angeles County Code, adopting the California Building Code, 2025 Edition (Part 2 of Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations), as amended and in effect on January 1, 2026, is adopted herein by reference as if fully set forth below and shall be known and may be cited as the Building Code of the City of Malibu.

The provisions of the Building Code applying to dwellings, lodging houses, congregate residences, hotels, motels, apartment houses, convents, monasteries, or other uses classified by the Building Code as a group R occupancy and including Chapters 1, 2, 3, 98

and 99 shall constitute and may be cited as the Housing Code of the City of Malibu.

In the event of any conflict between provisions of the California Building Code, 2025 Edition, Title 26 of the Los Angeles County Code, or any amendment to the Building Code contained in the Malibu Municipal Code, the provision contained in the later listed document shall control.

A copy of Title 26 of the Los Angeles County Code and the California Building Code, 2025 Edition, have been deposited in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Malibu and shall be at all times maintained by the City Clerk for use and examination by the public.

SECTION 3. Section 15.04.030 of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

15.04.030 Building Code fees.

Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 15.04.010, every fee provision set forth in Title 26, Building Code, of the Los Angeles County Code, including but not limited to Section 107, is replaced with this section, providing those fees are as established in the current City of Malibu fee schedule approved by resolution of the city council.

SECTION 4. Section 15.04.040 of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

15.04.040 Violation—Penalty.

Every person violating any provision of Title 26 of the Los Angeles County Code and appendices, adopted by reference by Section 15.04.010, or of any permit or license granted thereunder, or any rules or regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, is guilty of a misdemeanor. Upon conviction thereof he or she shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or imprisonment not to exceed six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment. The imposition of such penalty for any violation shall not excuse the violation or permit it to continue. Each day that a violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 5. Section 15.04.050 of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

15.04.050 Amendments to Building Code.

Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 15.04.010 of this Chapter, Title 26 of the Los Angeles County Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

A. Section 105.1.1 is hereby amended to read as follows:

105.1.1 General.

Unless otherwise provided for below, in order to conduct the hearings provided for in this code and also to determine the suitability of alternate materials and types of construction and to provide for reasonable interpretations of the provisions of this code, there shall be a building board of appeals consisting of five members who are qualified by experience and training to pass upon matters pertaining to building construction. The building official shall be an *ex officio*-member and shall act as secretary to the board. The members of the building board of appeals shall be appointed by the City Council and shall hold office at its pleasure. The building board of appeals shall adopt reasonable rules and regulations for conducting its investigations. The board shall establish that the approval for alternate materials and the modifications granted for individual cases are in conformity with the intent and purpose of this code and that such alternate material, modification or method of work offered is at least the equivalent of that prescribed in this code in quality, strength, effectiveness, fire resistance, durability, safety and sanitation and does not lessen any fire-protection requirements or any degree of structural integrity. The building board of appeals shall document all decisions and findings in writing to the building official with a duplicate copy to the applicant, and the board may recommend to the City Council such new legislation as is consistent therewith.

B. Section 105.3 is hereby deleted in its entirety.

C. Section 105.6 is hereby deleted in its entirety.

D. Section 106.1.1 is hereby added to Title 26 of the Los Angeles County Code to read as follows:

106.1.1 Parking Lots.

A plan review and permit shall be required for the surfacing, resurfacing, replacement, reconfiguration and striping of parking lots and parking structures serving commercial and multifamily occupancies.

Any of the aforementioned activities in or on existing parking lots must comply with current zoning, the National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (N.P.D.E.S.) permit program and accessibility requirements as required by applicable codes and standards. Fees are determined by the current fee schedule.

E. Section 106.3 is hereby amended to read as follows:

106.3 Work Exempted.

A building permit shall not be required for the following:

1. One-story detached accessory buildings used as tool and storage sheds, playhouses and similar uses, provided the projected roof area does not exceed 120 square feet and the plate height does not exceed 12 feet (3.69 m) in height above the grade plane at any point and the maximum roof projection does not exceed 24 inches.

2. Fences and walls not over 6 feet (1829 mm) in height.
3. Steel tanks supported on a foundation not more than two feet (610 mm) above grade when the height does not exceed 1 1/2 times the diameter.
4. Gantry cranes and similar equipment.
5. Retaining walls that retain not over 4 feet (1219 mm) in height measured from the bottom of the footing to the top of the wall, unless supporting a surcharge or impounding a Class I, II, or III-A liquids.
6. Motion picture, television and theater stage sets and scenery, except when used as a building.
7. Flagpoles not erected upon a building and not more than 15 feet (4572 mm) high.
8. A tree house provided that:
 - 8.1. It does not exceed 64 square feet (5.94 m²) in area nor 8 feet (2438 mm) in height from floor to roof.
 - 8.2. The ceiling height as established by door height or plate line does not exceed 6 feet (1829mm).
 - 8.3. Any structural components are not supported by grade.
9. Canopies or awnings attached to a Group R or U Occupancy and extending not more than 54 inches (1372 mm) from the exterior wall of the building and are not encroaching into the public right of way. Canopies or awnings shall be light weight construction (not to exceed five pounds per square foot)
10. Sheds or storage buildings, and other structures incidental to and work authorized by a valid grading or building permit. Such structures must be removed upon expiration of the permit or completion of the work covered by the permit.
11. Oil derricks.
12. Prefabricated swimming pools accessory to a Group R, Division 3 Occupancy in which the pool walls are entirely above the adjacent grade and if the capacity does not exceed 1,000 gallons (3785 L). Fences, gates, door alarms, and other protection devices that are accessory to the prefabricated swimming pool are not exempt from the permit requirements.

Unless otherwise exempted, separate plumbing, electrical and mechanical permits will be required for the above-exempted items.

Exemption from the permit requirements of this Code shall not be deemed to grant authorization for any work to be done in any manner in violation of the provisions of other

laws or ordinances.

F. Section 107.9 is hereby deleted in its entirety.

G. Section 108.1.1 is hereby added to Title 26 of the Los Angeles County Code to read as follows:

108.1.1 Occupancy Inspection.

All existing commercial occupancies are required to apply for an occupancy inspection prior to occupancy of a building or tenant space by a new owner or occupant.

Upon successful completion of the occupancy inspection the Building Official shall issue a new certificate of occupancy to the building or tenant space as required in Section 109 of the California Building Code.

The certificate of occupancy issued will remain valid and in effect until a change of occupant occurs or is revoked for cause by the Building Official or as required by this code.

Fees determined by the current fee schedule.

H. Section 108.4.2 is hereby amended to read as follows:

108.4.2 Foundation inspection.

Inspection shall be made after excavations for footings are complete and any required reinforcing steel is in place. For concrete foundations, any required forms shall be in place prior to inspection. All materials for the foundation shall be on the job site; however, where concrete is ready mixed in accordance with approved nationally recognized standards, the concrete need not be on the job site. Where the foundation is to be constructed of approved treated wood, additional inspections may be required by the building official. Required set back and pad elevations shall be established by survey prior to approval by the Building Official.

I. Section 108.4.6 is hereby amended to read as follows:

108.4.8 Final inspection.

Inspection shall be made after finish grading is approved and the building is completed and ready for occupancy and all other required agency approvals have been obtained.

SECTION 6. Section 15.08.010 of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

15.08.010 Adoption of Electrical Code.

Except as hereinafter provided, Title 27, Electrical Code, of the Los Angeles County Code, adopting the California Electrical Code, 2025 Edition (Part 3 of Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations), as amended and in effect on January 1, 2026, is adopted herein by reference as if fully set forth below, and shall be known and may be cited as the Electrical Code of the City of Malibu.

In the event of any conflict between provisions of the California Electrical Code, 2025 Edition, Title 27 of the Los Angeles County Code, or any amendment to the Electrical Code contained in the Malibu Municipal Code, the provision contained in the later listed document shall control.

A copy of Title 27 of the Los Angeles County Code and the California Electrical Code, 2025 Edition, have been deposited in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Malibu and shall be at all times maintained by the City Clerk for use and examination by the public.

SECTION 7. Section 15.08.030 of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

15.08.030 Violation—Penalty.

Every person violating any provision of Title 27 of the Los Angeles County Code and appendices, adopted by reference by Section 15.08.010, or of any permit or license granted thereunder, or any rules or regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, is guilty of a misdemeanor. Upon conviction thereof he or she shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or imprisonment not to exceed six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment. The imposition of such penalty for any violation shall not excuse the violation or permit it to continue. Each day that a violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 8. Section 15.12.010 of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

15.12.010 Adoption of Plumbing Code.

Except as hereinafter provided, Title 28, Plumbing Code, of the Los Angeles County Code, adopting the California Plumbing Code, 2025 Edition (Part 5 of Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations), as amended and in effect on January 1, 2026, is adopted herein by reference as if fully set forth below, and shall be known and may be cited as the Plumbing Code of the City of Malibu.

In the event of any conflict between provisions of the California Plumbing Code, 2025 Edition, Title 28 of the Los Angeles County Code, or any amendment to the Plumbing Code contained in the Malibu Municipal Code, the provision contained in the later listed document shall control.

A copy of Title 28 of the Los Angeles County Code and the California Plumbing Code, 2025 Edition, has been deposited in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Malibu

and shall be at all times maintained by the City Clerk for use and examination by the public.

SECTION 9. Section 15.12.030 of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

15.12.030 Violation—Penalty.

Every person violating any provision of Title 28 of the Los Angeles County Code and appendices, adopted by reference by Section 15.12.010, or of any permit or license granted thereunder, or any rules or regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, is guilty of a misdemeanor. Upon conviction thereof he or she shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or imprisonment not to exceed six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment. The imposition of such penalty for any violation shall not excuse the violation or permit it to continue. Each day that a violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 10. Section 15.12.040 of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

15.12.040 Fees.

Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 15.12.010, every fee provision set forth in Title 28, Plumbing Code, of the Los Angeles County Code is replaced with this section, providing that fees are as established in the current City of Malibu fee schedule approved by resolution of the city council.

SECTION 11. Section 15.12.050 of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

15.12.050 Amendment to Plumbing Code.

Notwithstanding the provisions of section 15.12.010 of this chapter, Title 28 of the Los Angeles County Code, adopting the California Plumbing Code, 2025 Edition (Part 5 of Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations), is hereby amended to read as follows:

A. Section 710.9 is hereby amended by adding the following:

All such sumps and receiving tanks shall be automatically discharged. All sumps shall be provided with pumps or ejectors of the duplex type, simplex pumps are prohibited, and shall be so arranged to function alternately with each pump or ejector cycle, and to function independently in case of overload or mechanical failure. The lowest inlet shall have a minimum clearance of two (2) inches for the high water "starting" level of the sump.

All such sumps and receiving tanks shall be equipped with an automatic alarm

system. The alarm system shall be activated upon failure of either pumps or ejectors, whether independently or simultaneously. The alarm shall emit an audible alarm, which can be detected from any location within the building and immediately outside the building served by such sumps and receiving tanks. The Building Official may approve other alarm systems, which provide equivalent enunciation of failure of the pumps or ejectors.

B. Table 702.1, Note 6 is hereby amended by adding the following:

6.1 A water closet shall be computed as three (3) fixture units if the proposed water closet is categorized as a flushometer tank with a 1.6 GPF. Specifications of the flushometer tank shall be submitted to the Environmental Health Administrator for review.

C. Subsection 1503.1(C) is hereby amended to read as follows:

(C) Graywater shall not be used in spray irrigation, allowed to pond or runoff and shall not be discharged directly into or be conveyed to surface water, including but not limited to, the ocean or any creek, any surface body of water, any water way, any storm sewer system, any drainage channel, or any drainage device.

D. Subsection 1503.1(J) is hereby added to the 2025 California Plumbing Code / Los Angeles County Plumbing Code to read as follows:

(J) No construction permit for any graywater system shall be issued until a plot plan with appropriate data satisfactory to the City has been submitted and approved. When there is insufficient lot area or inappropriate soil conditions to prevent the ponding or runoff of the graywater, as determined by the City, no graywater system shall be allowed.

E. Subsection 1501.3 is hereby amended to read as follows:

1501.3 Permit. It shall be unlawful for a person to construct, install, alter, or cause to be constructed, installed, or altered an alternate water source system in a building or on a premise without first obtaining a permit to do such work. Prior to commencing the issuance of permits for indoor gray water systems pursuant to state requirements relating to gray water, a city, county, city and county or other local agency shall seek consultation with the local public health department to ensure that local public health concerns are addressed in local standards or ordinances, or in issuing permits. See California Water Code Section 14877.3.

1501.3.1 City Permit. A written construction permit shall be obtained from the City prior to the erection, construction, reconstruction, installation, relocation, or alteration of any graywater system. A permit for a clothes washer system shall be fee exempt for review and inspection services. Permits for simple and complex systems shall be required with fees for such systems determined by City Council Resolution.

1501.3.2 Clothes Washer System. A clothes washer system shall require the issuance of a fee exempt construction permit for the installation or alteration of the system.

F. Section 1503.1.2 is hereby amended to read as follows:

1502.1.2 Simple System. Simple systems exceed a clothes water system and shall comply with the following:

1. The discharge capacity of a graywater system shall be determined by Section 1502.8. Simple systems have a discharge capacity of 250 gallons (947 L) per day or less.
2. A simple system shall require a construction permit issued by the City.
3. The design of simple systems shall be acceptable to the City and shall meet generally acceptable graywater system design criteria.

G. Section 1503.1.3 is hereby amended to read as follows:

1503.1.3 Complex System. Any graywater system that is not a clothes washer system or simple system shall comply with the following:

1. The discharge capacity of a graywater system shall be determined by Section 1503.8. Complex systems have a discharge capacity over 250 gallons (947 L) per day.
2. Complex systems shall require a construction permit issued by the City.
3. A complex system shall be designed by a person who can demonstrate competence to the satisfaction of the Enforcing Agency.

G. Subsection 1202.13 is hereby added to the 2025 California Plumbing Code / Los Angeles County Plumbing Code to read as follows:

1504.9.2 New Construction, Remodels, Alterations

1. All new single-family residential dwelling units, single family residential remodels, and single-family residential alterations proposing to construct, reconstruct, install, relocate, or alter any clothes washing drainage plumbing shall include either a separate multiple pipe outlet or a diverter valve, and outside stub-out installation on the clothes washing machine connection to allow separate discharge of graywater for irrigation.

Exception: Separate clothes washer drainage is not required where it has been demonstrated to the City that such clothes washer facilitation is infeasible due to the location of the fixture and/or compliance with other provisions of this code.

2. All new single family residential dwelling units, single family residential remodels, and single-family residential alterations proposing to construct, reconstruct, install, relocate, or alter any drains or drainage for any lavatories, showers, and bathtubs, shall provide separate segregated drainage from all other plumbing fixtures and connect a minimum three (3) feet from the limits of the foundation to allow for future installation of a distributed graywater system.

Exception: Separate clothes washer drainage is not required where it has been demonstrated to the City that such clothes washer facilitation is infeasible due to the location of the fixture and/or compliance with other provisions of this code.

1504.9.3 Prohibited Areas for Graywater Installations.

The following areas are designated as inappropriate for the installation of any graywater system. Graywater drainage to these areas has been determined to pose a significant risk to public health, the environment, and the City’s coastal and natural resources. These prohibited areas are in addition to the minimum horizontal distances required from a graywater system described in Table 1602.4.

- (A) All beach front properties where the dispersal area for the graywater system is within 150 feet of the ocean mean higher high tide line.
- (B) Within 250 feet of any impaired body of water as designated on the 303d listed water bodies by the State of California Water Resources Control Board.

Exception: Compliance with (A) above.

- (C) Within 100 feet of a bluff top.”

In the event of any conflict between provisions of the California Mechanical Code, 2025 Edition, Title 29 of the Los Angeles County Code, or any amendment to the Mechanical Code contained in the Malibu Municipal Code, the provision contained in the later listed document shall control.

A copy of Title 29 of the Los Angeles County Code and the California Mechanical Code, 2025 Edition, have been deposited in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Malibu and shall be at all times maintained by the City Clerk for use and examination by the public.

SECTION 13. Section 15.16.030 of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 15.16.030 Violations—Penalty.

Every person violating any provision of Title 29 of the Los Angeles County Code and appendices, adopted by reference by Section 15.16.010, or of any permit or license granted thereunder, or any rules or regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, is guilty of a misdemeanor. Upon conviction thereof he or she shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or imprisonment not to exceed six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment. In the event of any conflict between provisions of the California Green Building Standards Code, 2025 Edition, Title 31 of the Los Angeles County Code, or any amendment to the Green Building Standards Code contained in the Malibu Municipal Code, the provision contained in the later listed document shall control.

A copy of Title 31 of the Los Angeles County Code and the California Green Building Standards Code, 2025 Edition, have been deposited in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Malibu and shall be at all times maintained by the City Clerk for use and examination by the public.

SECTION 18. Section 15.24.040 of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 15.24.040 Violations—Penalties.

Every person violating any provision of the California Green Building Standards Code, 2025 Edition and appendices, adopted by reference by Section 15.24.010, or of any permit or license granted thereunder, or any rules or regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, is guilty of a misdemeanor. Upon conviction thereof he or she shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or imprisonment not to exceed six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment. The imposition of such penalty for any violation shall not excuse the violation or permit it to continue. Each day that a violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 21. Section 15.28.020 of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 15.28.020 Definitions.

Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 15.28.010, the definitions in Section 15.04.020 are adopted by reference and incorporated into this Chapter 15.28 as if fully set forth below.

SECTION 22. Section 15.28.040 of the Malibu Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 15.28.040 Violations—Penalties.

Every person violating any provision of the Existing Building Code, adopted by Section 15.06.010, or of any permit or license granted thereunder, or any rules or regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, is guilty of a misdemeanor. Upon conviction thereof he or she shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or imprisonment not to exceed six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Should any section, subsection, clause, or provision of this Ordinance for any reason be held to be invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of the remaining portions of this Ordinance; it being hereby expressly declared that this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, and phrase hereof would have been prepared, proposed, approved, and ratified irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, or phrases be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 30. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall take effect 30 days after its passage and adoption pursuant to California Government Code section 36937 and shall apply to all projects submitted to the City for plan check and/or permit application on or after that date.

SECTION 31. California Environmental Quality Act.

The City Council determines that this Ordinance is exempt from review under the California Environmental Quality Act (California Public Resources Code §§ 21000 et seq., "CEQA") and the regulations promulgated thereunder (14 California Code of Regulations §§ 15000 et seq., the "State CEQA Guidelines") because it does not meet the definition of a "project" under Public Resources Code § 21065 and is covered by the common sense exception under 14 California Code of Regulations § 15061(b)(3) as it consists only of minor revisions and clarifications to an existing code of construction related regulations and specification of procedures related thereto and will not have the effect of deleting or substantially changing any regulatory standards or findings required therefor. This ordinance is an action being taken for enhanced protection of the environment and does not have a reasonably foreseeable direct or indirect physical change on the environment or the potential to cause significant effects on the environment.

SECTION 32. Certification.

The City Clerk shall certify the adoption of this Ordinance.

The City Clerk shall file a certified copy of this Ordinance with the California Building Standards Commission.



Subject: Request to Re-Establish a Temporary Volunteer Fire Rebuild Ambassador (Continued from December 8, 2025)

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Discuss and provide direction regarding the request to re-establish a Temporary Volunteer Fire Rebuild Ambassador.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no fiscal impact associated with the recommended action.

DISCUSSION: At the October 27, 2025, City Council meeting, the Council directed staff to return with a discussion to re-establish a Temporary Volunteer Fire Rebuild Ambassador.

On May 21, 2025, the City Council adopted resolution no. 25-24, establishing Abe Roy as the temporary volunteer position of Rebuild Ambassador for a three-month term. On September 29, 2025, Abe Roy resigned from the volunteer position.

Beginning in October, staff began to engage with Rebuild Zone Captains to collect neighborhood specific insights and strengthen homeowner representation throughout the rebuilding process. These captains serve as a bridge between fire-impacted property owners and the city, improving access to resources and enabling direct feedback. Staff meets with the Rebuild Captains on a weekly basis.

As of November 13, 2025, 16 building permits for single-family homes have been issued within the Palisades burn area.

Subject: Receive and File Update on Malibu's Community Lands (Continued from December 8, 2025)

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Receive and file an update on Malibu's Community Lands, and provide direction to staff as appropriate.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no fiscal impact associated with the recommended action.

STRATEGIC PLAN IMPLEMENTATION: This item supports the City's 2025 Strategic Plan Goal 7: Explore New Opportunities for Educational, Cultural and Recreational Establishments

DISCUSSION: The Malibu Community Lands Project was established to determine the most appropriate use of 61 acres of city-owned vacant land. This community driven initiative has engaged residents through a variety of outreach methods to ensure the project aligns with Malibu's vision and mission statement. On February 12, 2024, the City of Malibu entered into an agreement with Tripepi Smith & Associates, for Community Outreach and Engagement Consulting for City Owned Vacant Lots.

On October 28, 2024 the City Council received and filed the Community Lands Outreach and Engagement Report. Based on the input received throughout the program, the City Council authorized staff to begin a phased approach for developing the lands, prioritizing community needs. Per City Council recommendation, the approved next steps include:

- Heathercliff and Ioki (Chili Cook-Off Lot) Lots: The City will explore options for new soccer, baseball and softball fields as well as a multigenerational community center, including a pool, gymnasium, senior center and expanded library services.
- Triangle and Trancas lots: The Council has not set direction for these lands at this time.
- La Paz Lot: The Council tasked staff and the Malibu Arts Commission in preparing a draft design recommendation of the La Paz Performing Arts Center in partnership with Cross Creek Ranch Malibu, LLC not to exceed \$10,000 in planning services.

As part of this item, staff will present current updates and the status of each of the Community Lands sites, outlining progress made since Council's previous direction.

PROPOSED CITY COUNCIL POLICY RESOLUTION

RESOLUTION NO. 25-__

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MALIBU DECLARING THE CITY'S POLICY RESPECTING LIKE-FOR-LIKE DISASTER REBUILDS AND DIRECTING THE CITY TO TAKE VARIOUS ACTIONS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THAT POLICY

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MALIBU HEREBY RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

The City Council of the City of Malibu (the "City Council") hereby declares that it is the policy of the City of Malibu (the "City") to facilitate the expeditious, efficient and economical rebuild of all structures in the City destroyed or materially damaged by wildfire, earthquake, flood, landslide, mudslide or similar disaster in substantially the same location as the destroyed or damaged structure and in a like-for-like manner that does not exceed 110% of the area, height or bulk of the structure destroyed or materially damaged (a "Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuild").

In furtherance of the foregoing City policy, the City Council directs the following:

1. The City shall take all necessary and appropriate action to ensure that no person or entity employed by, or contracted to provide services to, the City (the "City Staff") imposes any requirement that does not exist under applicable federal, state, county, or other law (including the Malibu Municipal Code or "MMC")) for the approval and issuance of a planning verification (a "PV"), the completion of a plan check, the approval and issuance of a building permit, or the approval and issuance of any other permit required to be issued by the City for a Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuild. In so doing, any doubt respecting the application of a legal requirement or the manner if its application respecting any Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuild shall be resolved in favor of the City's policy to facilitate the expeditious, efficient and economical design and construction of structures destroyed or materially damaged by wildfire,

earthquake, flood, landslide, mudslide or similar disaster as a Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuild. To that end, whenever there is a difference of opinion on an issue that the Director of the Community Development Department (the “CDD Director”) recognizes to be a difference of opinion upon which reasonable professional civil engineers might differ, the City Staff shall defer to the stamped and certified decision of the civil engineer employed by an applicant so long as such civil engineer is a California licensed civil engineer experienced in the particular practice that is implicated by the item in controversy (e.g., structural, geotechnical, electrical, coastal, environmental, etc.).

2. Every reasonable and legally permissible effort must be pursued to liberalize the process of securing building code approval for Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuilds. As such, the City shall identify requirements of the building code that may impede the efficient, expeditious, and economical design and construction of Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuilds (especially where the property is on the beach or an area that has exhibited historical geological instability) and explore ways to overcome such impediments, such as, for example, eliminating the need for geotechnical analysis for Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuilds to be reconstructed on flat pads where pre-existing data provides a sufficient basis for the property owner’s geotechnical engineer to be satisfied respecting slope stability and other factors and the property owner is willing to assume the risk of an undetected issue. Additionally, efforts should be pursued to secure the Governor’s further relaxation of the building code for requirements that do not provide a real and necessary foundation for safety. Among other things, efforts must be pursued to permit residents to use pre-existing foundations and septic systems that were not destroyed by the Palisades Fire. And, if practicable, the process for obtaining proof of geological stability in previously developed areas of historic instability needs to be streamlined.

3. All improvements to the process of applying for and obtaining approval for the design and construction of Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuilds, which the CDD Director presented to the City Council at the Special Meeting of the City Council on October 15, 2025 shall be implemented in an expeditious manner, and the City Manager, or such other person the City Manager might designate, shall provide a status report to the City Council of the implementation of the improvements

at each Regular Meeting of the City Council until such time as all such improvements have been implemented.

4. When dealing with an application respecting a Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuild, it is imperative that all members of the City Staff are single-mindedly focused on finding ways to facilitate the efficient, expeditious and economical construction of Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuilds. By the same token, when dealing with matters other than Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuilds, it also is imperative that the members of the City Staff remain committed to and focused on pursuing Malibu's vision and mission of constraining development to preserve Malibu's fragile rural nature.

5. Each Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuild shall be assigned to specific members of the City Staff who will be responsible for handling all aspects of the Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuild assigned to them that is within their area of expertise, and who must work in coordination with one another and not in a serial or separate manner, in order to provide continuous support, advocacy, and problem resolution throughout the process. Because Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuilds in different areas of Malibu will present different challenges, consideration should be given to dividing up the work among members of the City staff by the area in which the Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuilds are being pursued – i.e., on the beachfront, on a landslide area, on a stable hillside, on relatively flat property along the landside of PCH, etc. It also would be helpful for the City to employ or contract for the services of "case managers," who can be tasked with the assignment of following all Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuilds from the time of initial submission to the issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy, and whose responsibilities will include interfacing with the member(s) of the City Staff working on the projects being followed by the case managers.

6. The CDD Director, or such person designated by the CDD Director, shall develop a written comprehensive checklist of items that City Staff is required to consider and address in the first pass of a completed PV, plan-check, or building permit application – such that an applicant will not be met with successive requests or qualifications (other than those created by changes made by the applicant following a review that does

not result in an approval). There also must be a measurable time period between submission of a completed PV, plan-check or building permit application and approval or denial thereof, and any denial should be accompanied by a written explanation of all reasons for the denial.

7. Applicants for Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuild shall be permitted to obtain a PV for the structure(s) on their property separate from and prior to the submission and approval of a landscaping plan, geotechnical studies, drainage plan and/or erosion control plan. They also shall be able to obtain a building permit (but not a certificate of occupancy) separate from and prior to landscaping, Dark Skies, and other matters that do not impact the plan and construction of the main residence and other structures that predated the disaster that destroyed or substantially damaged their structure(s). For properties on the beach, applicants for a Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuild shall be permitted to obtain a PV and a building permit (but not a certificate of occupancy) without accounting for whether the rebuild will utilize an OWTS or a sewer connection, so long as the addition of either will not alter the plan and can be accomplished after the rebuild is otherwise completed.

8. Given the number of crucial decisions that need to be made corresponding to Like-for-Like Disaster Rebuilds, the CDD Director, or such other person as the CDD Director should designate, shall provide a progress report to the City Council at each Regular Meeting of the City Council and identify all outstanding issues of significance until they are resolved to the satisfaction of the City Council. The City shall establish targets, goals and metrics for reviews that are published and tracked to identify areas of continuous improvement.
