CITY OF MALIBU TO WELCOME NEW CITY MANAGER

I am pleased to share that the City Council voted unanimously to appoint Joseph “Joe” Irvin, ICMA-CM, MPA as Malibu’s next City Manager following an extensive and competitive recruitment process. Joe, the current City Manager of South Lake Tahoe, brings over two decades of municipal leadership, with expertise in emergency management, community development, environmental stewardship, and organizational leadership in wildfire-prone areas. His “people first” approach and experience in communities balancing tourism, environmental constraints, and wildfire risk make him well suited to lead Malibu forward. He will begin his tenure with the City of Malibu on March 2, 2026.

His professional background includes service with four cities—Sequim, Washington, Marco Island, Florida, Healdsburg, California and South Lake Tahoe, California—each presenting distinct operational, environmental and community challenges.

Mayor Marianne Riggins stated “Joe Irvin brings the right combination of experience, judgment, and values to guide Malibu through its next chapter. His leadership reflects a genuine people-first approach, a steady hand during emergencies, and a thoughtful, strategic perspective on long-term community priorities. Joe has demonstrated the ability to lead with transparency, collaboration, and compassion—qualities that align strongly with Malibu’s expectations for its City Manager. We are confident he will serve our residents, Council and staff with integrity and excellence.”

Irvin is a Credentialed City Manager (ICMA-CM) through the International City/County Management Association, He holds a BS degree in Environmental Science and Resource Management from California State University Channel Islands and an MPA from The Evergreen State College.

Beyond his professional achievements, Irvin is the proud father of Michaela and husband to his wife of over twenty years, Kate.

Throughout this immense hardship, Malibu found strength in unity, compassion, and healing. This important remembrance will include space for neighbors, friends, and strangers to come together, share memories, and support one another, reflect, connect, and heal.

The program includes a moment of silence, a native Chumash blessing, a special poem recited by Malibu’s Poet Laureate, soothing music, food, a memorial space, and an art tribute.

MALIBU CITY COUNCIL VOTES UNANIMOUSLY FOR CRUCIAL STEP IN SCHOOL UNIFICATION

The City Council approved the full school unification package in a unanimous vote on December 8. With this historic vote, the City of Malibu and Santa-Monica-Malibu Unified School District formally align on the structural, financial, and operational framework for separation. The separation package includes Property Tax Revenue Sharing Agreement, Operational Transfer Agreement, and Joint Powers Agreement.

This unanimous vote reflects Malibu’s unwavering commitment to building our own independent, locally controlled school district that is responsive, community-driven, and positioned to deliver the highest-quality education for our children for generations to come. The City Council and the SMMUSD Board are hand-in-hand on moving forward to the next phase. The City thanks the countless residents who have worked and advocated for years to get us to this point.

Next, the City of Malibu and SMMUSD will work together to pursue special state legislation necessary to establish the two new independent school districts. The City will continue providing updates as the process moves forward.

WINTER HOLIDAY HOURS

City Hall will be closed in observance of the winter holidays from Wednesday, December 24 through Friday, January 2. While general City services will be paused during this period, the City of Malibu remains committed to supporting residents impacted by the Broad, Franklin and Palisades Fires. Rebuild-related services and emergency support will continue to be available.

City Parks - OPEN for regular hours, 8:00 AM to sunset.

The Michael Landon Community Center - OPEN from 8:00 AM to 12:00 PM on Wednesday, December 24, and Wednesday, December 31, and will remain open for regular hours, 8:00 AM to sunset all other days.

The Community Swimming Pool - CLOSED Wednesday, December 24 and Thursday, December 25, and Wednesday, December 31 and Thursday, January 1.

Senior Center - CLOSED from Wednesday, December 24, through Friday, January 2, and will reopen on Monday, January 5.

Rebuild Center Operations - open on a limited basis to assist fire-affected property owners and applicants. Plan reviews will continue, and staff will be accepting submittals and corrections.

- **Closed: December 24 (Christmas Eve), December 25 (Christmas Day), December 31 (New Year's Eve), and January 1 (New Year's Day)**

PLANS APPROVED FOR MALIBU LIBRARY FUNDING

On December 8, the City Council approved a plan to guide upcoming discussions with the Los Angeles County Library on how dedicated Malibu Library funds may be used in Fiscal Year 2026–27. These funds come from a portion of property taxes paid by Malibu residents and are set aside specifically to support and improve Malibu Library programs, services, and facilities. This action does not impact the City's budget. The Malibu Library Set Aside Fund ensures that local tax dollars benefit the Malibu community. The Council's approval helps ensure thoughtful planning, transparency, and continued investment in a library that serves as an important educational and community resource for residents of all ages.

MALIBU MARKS ONE-YEAR SINCE THE FRANKLIN FIRE

The City of Malibu recognized the one-year anniversary of the Franklin Fire at the December 8 City Council meeting, honoring those impacted and thanking the agencies, community volunteers and organizations that supported response and recovery efforts. The commemoration provided a moment to reflect on the challenges of the past year while reaffirming Malibu's strength, resilience, and commitment to rebuilding.

The Franklin Fire ignited on December 9, 2024, near Malibu Canyon Road. Fueled by strong Santa Ana winds, it grew to 4,037 acres over nine days, destroying 20 structures, including four homes, and damaging 28 others. Fortunately, there were no fatalities.

The City Council emphasized its continued dedication to supporting impacted residents and expressed deep gratitude to all who stood with Malibu. Certificates of appreciation were presented to partner agencies and organizations, and residents gathered to honor the many volunteers and responders.

Randy, born in 1969, lived over 30 years in Malibu, known for his warmth, humor, and love of the ocean. He was a familiar presence at Surfrider Beach, offering encouragement, sharing stories, and inspiring the community. Tragically, he lost his life on January 7, 2025, in the Palisades Fire.

EMERGENCY RENT RELIEF PROGRAM APPLICATIONS OPENING DEC. 17

The Los Angeles County Department of Consumer and Business Affairs (DCBA) is launching a \$23 million Emergency Rent Relief Program to support tenants and qualifying property owners impacted by the Eaton or Palisades fire, windstorm events, and any other emergency financial hardships.

Applications open December 17 at 9:00 AM and will remain open until funding is exhausted. Grants may cover up to six months of rent debt and may be used for mortgage payments, unpaid rent, or other eligible emergency-related expenses. Tenants with emergency-related rent debt cannot apply directly but are encouraged to refer their landlords to the program.

MALIBU FIRE REBUILDS COMMUNITY GATHERING OF HOPE

The City of Malibu welcomed fire rebuild families to the final Malibu Fire Rebuilds Community Gathering of the year. The event was a restorative time to connect and support malibu residents through the journey toward rebuilding. The program opened with intentions for community healing, followed by meaningful blessings from our local faith leaders Msgr. Charles Chaffman from Our Lady of Malibu Catholic Church and Rabbi Marcelo Gindin – Malibu Jewish Center & Synagogue. Community leaders Gus Peterson (Malibu Community Long Term Recovery Group), Shannon Dunn (Boys & Girls Club of Malibu), Brent Woodworth (Community Bridge), and Wade Major (Malibu Rebuild Taskforce) shared a message of hope and resilience. The program concluded with remarks from Community Development Director Yolanda Bundy and Mayor Marianne Riggins, who expressed gratitude and encouragement to families as they continued rebuilding their homes and lives. Attendees also participated in holiday arts and crafts projects, a community message wall signing, and connection with City staff.



GEOTECHNICAL WORKSHOP SUPPORTS FIRE REBUILDS

On December 10, the City hosted a Fire Rebuilds Geotechnical Workshop with more than 40 licensed professionals to support rebuilding efforts. The workshop introduced new City geotechnical review consultants and provided a forum to improve coordination, share challenges, and streamline the review process.

Updated Building Code: 2025 Cycle

- Malibu historically adopts the State codes as amended by Los Angeles County
- These codes are specifically designed to meet stricter standards, reflecting local safety regulations based on our local climatic, geological, and/or topographical conditions.
- The last update to the California Building Standards Code as amended by the County was approved by our City Council on December 12, 2022.

MALIBU ADOPTS 2025 CALIFORNIA BUILDING CODES

On December 8, the City Council adopted the 2025 editions of the California Building, Residential, Green Building, Plumbing, Mechanical, Electrical, Existing Building, Fire, and Energy Codes as amended by Los Angeles County. The ordinance replaces prior local standards, incorporates amendments tailored to Malibu's unique climatic, geological, and topographical conditions, and ensures continuity of building standards for safety, fire, and seismic resilience. On January 12, 2026, the City Council will consider an ordinance to update Malibu's building rules to adopt the latest 2025 California and Los Angeles County codes, with local changes to keep new construction safe and suited to Malibu's unique conditions.

FIRE REBUILD UPDATE – CALTRANS PERMIT GUIDANCE

Caltrans has updated guidance for fire rebuild projects regarding shoulder closures and encroachment permits. A permit is not required when materials (like lumber or concrete) are temporarily loaded or unloaded within a legal parking area on the shoulder, as long as:

- Activities occur Monday–Friday, 9:00 AM – 3 PM
- Work vehicles do not enter travel lanes
- All applicable laws and regulations are followed

This guidance is effective immediately.

A Caltrans representative is available at the Rebuild Center every Tuesday from 9 AM to 2 PM to answer questions.

PCH LAS FLORES & RAMBLA PACIFICO INTERSECTION IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

More than 20 participants joined City staff, Caltrans, and community members at the December 10 public workshop for the PCH / Las Flores and Rambla Pacifico Intersection Improvements Project. Four conceptual alternatives were presented, and attendees provided input to guide future designs aimed at improving safety and traffic flow. Community outreach will continue as feedback is analyzed and preliminary plans are prepared for the next workshop, expected in about two months.

CITY COUNCIL APPROVES CALTRANS PCH SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS PLAN

Improving safety along Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) remains a top City priority. On November 24, the Malibu City Council approved Caltrans' PCH Pavement Rehabilitation Projects, bringing major safety and mobility upgrades from Santa Monica to the Ventura County line. The two-part project is led and funded by Caltrans, with the City serving as a reviewing agency. Improvements include roadway resurfacing; upgraded ADA curb ramps, guardrails, and lighting; new sidewalks at select bus stops; updated signage; Class II bike lanes and striping; pedestrian warning signs; and improved visibility at crossings and driveways.

Project I, from Cross Creek Road to the Ventura County line, is expected to begin in summer 2026 and run through winter 2029, with an estimated cost of \$64 million.

Project II, from the McClure Tunnel to Cross Creek Road, is expected to begin in fall 2027 and continue through summer 2030, at an estimated cost of \$85 million.

These improvements reflect priorities identified in the City's 2015 PCH Safety Study and community feedback, and come as the community marks two years since the tragic deaths of four Pepperdine students killed by a speeding motorist on PCH.

The City thanks Caltrans for its partnership and will keep residents informed as the projects move forward.

FIRE CONDITIONS UPDATE – MODERATE FIRE DANGER, HIGH FUEL MOISTURE AND RAIN IN THE FORECAST

Current fire danger for Malibu is moderate. However, the more than 3 inches of rain Malibu received in November significantly raised the moisture level of dead fuels and live fuels - key indicators of how large and fast a fire can grow. Live fuel moisture in the Santa Monica Mountains was measured at 98% on November 22, so our fire threat is lower. (Below 80% is conducive to fire, and below 60% is critical.)

Malibu can expect warm, dry, slightly windy, sunny weather until December 19, followed by cooler, cloudy weather. Rain is expected Tuesday, December 23 and Wednesday, December 24 (as much as 1.5 inches total).

Humidity percentage levels for the coming 10 days will vary, ranging from 42% up to 82% during the expected rain.

On December 10, the City began providing daytime professional security services at Legacy Park and Malibu Bluffs Park as part of ongoing efforts to improve public safety. The armed guards will be patrolling the parks 7:30 AM to 4:30 PM daily for a 120-day period while the City prepares a bid for longer-term security services. The armed guards will be working closely with the Los Angeles County Sheriff’s Department, City staff, and all City contractors providing services within park grounds to address illegal behavior.
